MARCH RECORD OF DIVIDENDS.

Nine Utah Mines Participate in The Distribution of \$333,500 to Shareholders

PARK CITY CAMP LEADS AGAIN.

Gemini Paid \$10 a Share, or \$50,000—Annie Laurie Came Forward With \$12,500.

The month of March closes with a dividend record of \$333,500 to its credit. As usual, Park City heads the list with \$217,000 from the Daly-West and Silver King, or 65 and 66-2 cents per share respectively. Tintic is second with contributions from the Grand Central and Gemini, the former paying 10 cents, and the latter \$10 a share. The Annie Laurie of the Gold Mountain district is credited with 50 cents a share; the Century of Park Valley with three cents; the Horn Silver of Frisco with five cents; the Utah of Fish Springs with one cent, and the Sacramento of Mercur with a half cent a share.

The indications are favorable for a much more gratifying record during the month of April, unless it should be decided by the directors of the Daly-West to cut down the usual dividend, for that property was weaker than yesterday, the stock transferring on the open board as low as \$25.25. Lower Mammoth found takers at 35 cents; Daly-Judge and Daly held up to yesterday's quotations, but no transfers were recorded.

COURTS WILL AIR MAJESTIC TROUBLES

Two Receivers Appointed Following Which Came Bankruptcy—Before Judge Marshall.

H. ALTMAN AND R. R. TANNER

The Receivers—Former for Colorado, Latter for Utah—Fierce Legal Battle Predicted.

Evansville, Wyo., March 29.—A terrific gas pressure has been found in the oil well of the Bettys company in the Uinta fields. Recently large quantities of clay have been forced up through the casing and this has greatly retarded operations. Every few minutes the heavy bit used in drilling would be lifted as though it only weighed a few pounds. Operations have been suspended until larger casing arrives.

The drillers say the gas pressure is something enormous for every time it makes a move it lifts casing and machinery weighing over 3,000 pounds. The company expects to strike a big flow of oil in the next 100 feet.

SMELTER TO RESUME.

North American Plant in Encampment District, Wyoming.

Grand Encampment, Wyo., March 28.—It is expected that the smelting works of the North American Copper company will resume operations here in the latter part of this week. The many improvements which are being made are now nearing completion. The concentrator will be started first and as soon as there is sufficient material in the mill the smelter will be started up. The aerial tramway between Encampment and the Ferris-Haggarty mine has been repaired and will resume work with the starting up of the concentrator. There are about 10,000 tons of high grade ore at the mine already to be loaded into the tramway buckets and until this supply is exhausted the force at the mine will not be increased.

OIL MEN ACTIVE.

Country South of the Lake Near Grantsville Has Been Located.

Grantsville, March 30.—It has been learned that nearly all the lands along the south end of the Great Salt Lake and extending as far as Big Springs at the point of the mountain in Skull valley have been leased and located by parties who are anticipating an oil boom in this state.

J. R. Morris of Salt Lake, accompanied by Engineers Talamantes and Heist and two chaimers, representing Utah syndicate have just completed a survey of lands along the lake north of Grantsville in which they have occupied 10 days time.

This party has leased several thousand acres of land as well as located about all the available lands along the lake shore open to location.

Mr. Morris states that his party discovered a number of springs on a portion of the ground located which bubbles gas and seemingly some oil.

If general opinion goes for anything it would seem that Grantsville is in the very heart of the most promising petroleum fields of the state, and if such be the case the city will shortly become the metropolis of Tootie county.

The Morris party is the third one that has been here during the past month to secure land for oil purposes.

HODSON TO QUIT.

Manager of the Lincoln Mine Will Soon Leave Idaho Property.

According to the Boise Capital News, John T. Hodson is about to retire from the management of the Lincoln mine at Pearl, Ida. It says: "There is a rumor afloat in mining circles that John Hodson is soon to retire from the management of the Lincoln mine. Mr. Hodson was seen Friday about the mine, but he denied that he was out, and said he knew nothing of any contemplated change. However, the rumor will not down, and the belief is that a change will soon be made in the management."

"There is another story afloat that David Kennedy, one of the principal owners of the mine, has an option on Mr. Hodson's stock, and that he will soon take it up. Mr. Kennedy is now east and cannot be seen. Those who are familiar with the affairs of the company are inclined to credit the rumor."

"It is known that Mr. Kennedy has some extensive plans for the development of various properties in the Pearl district the coming summer aside from putting the Lincoln in a good condition."

"Mr. Hodson has recently been spending considerable time in Salt Lake, and it is understood that he has investigated numerous mining enterprises in Mexico. There is another rumor afloat that he has taken an option on some of Bob Chatten's property, to which he will soon devote the major part of his attention."

"Putting these rumors all together there are grounds for believing that he is soon to retire from the management of the Lincoln mine."

Well Known Miner Dead.

The remains will be shipped to his old home at Spanish Fork, Friday morning, for burial.

A TETRO DIVIDEND.

Manager Pollock Says Matter Will Be Discussed at Next Board Meeting.

The directors of the Tetro Mining company are scheduled to meet next Saturday and among the matters to come up for consideration, said Manager James A. Pollock this morning, will be that of declaring a dividend.

Mr. Pollock said he could not say what action would be taken as he had not obtained the views of his associates on the subject, but undoubtedly the advisability of passing out a bunch of "velvet" to shareholders would receive attention.

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For the present, at least, the plan to consolidate the Majestic mines in Beaver county with the Monarch enterprises is blocked, notwithstanding the favorable action taken by a majority of the shareholders at the meeting held in New York last Monday. The minority holders, who have opposed the merger and recently formulated what is known as a "defense committee," will have their inning and undertake to air their difficulties in the courts.

Until yesterday the utmost secrecy prevailed in their movements, but when it became known late in the day that a Colorado judge had appointed Col. Henry Altman as receiver for the properties now in such fearful financial distress, and later that Judge Marionaux, presiding over the district court at Nephi, had appointed R. R. Tanner a receiver for the creditors of this state, a tumult of the creditors who had been shut out by the creation of receivers immediately sought relief in the Federal court and proceedings in involuntary bankruptcy were instituted to resist the receivers, so the fight is on and it will be carried to the finish.

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
