## DIED.

At his residence, Portage, Box Elder Co., March 10th, of lung and brain fever, THOMAS G. BEN, aged 74 years, 1 month and 12 days.

Deceased was born January 27, 1800; baptized March 13, 1838, by Elder Wm. Clayton, in Manchester, England; emigrated from Liverpool, Sept. 8, 1840, with the first ship load of Saints that ever crossed the sea, in the ship *North America*; went to Kirtland, staying there eighteen months; then went to Nauvoo, where he worked on the Temple and made all the bricks for the front of the Nauvoo House; was in all the trials and troubles of the Saints until after the martyrdom of Joseph and Hyrum; emigrated to Utah in 1849; went from Salt Lake City to Lehi; thence to the iron works; thence to Beaver City; thence to Wellsville, Cache County, where he was President of the High Priests' Quorum until he came to Portage, Malad Valley, in the Spring of 1867, moving his family to said place in November; was appointed Presiding Bishop of Portage, May 24, 1868, which office he filled with integrity of heart until July 12, 1869, when he was released from those duties; always faithful in all his known duties; lived and died in full faith in the Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

He was buried March 12.—Com.

At Willard, March 19, PHOEBE HARDING, aged 64 years and 3 days.

Deceased was born at Florence, Oneida Co., New York, March 16, 1811; baptized by Leonard Rich, Jan. 20, 1839, at Warsaw, Genesee Co., N. Y.; arrived at Salt Lake Valley in 1850. The departed is a sister of Judge Holbrook, of Bountiful, and of Chandler Holbrook, of Fillmore. Her death causes a feeling of sorrow to pass over the hearts of many, as she was an active member of the Relief Society and a faithful teacher in our Sabbath School.—Ogden Junction, March 23.

At Fillmore, March 19th, SAMUEL, son of Daniel and Abigail McBride.

Deceased was born at Stillwater, Saratoga Co., N. Y., August 25th, 1789; served his country in the war of 1812 as a volunteer in the New York militia, till the close of the war between the United States and Great Britain, when he heard the gospel preached, believed it, and was baptized in June, 1833, in Villanova, Chautauque Co., N. Y.; moved to Kirtland, Ohio, in the Spring of 1839; in the summer or fall of 1848 moved to Missouri with his family; returned to Pike Co., Illinois, in the spring of 1850, with the Saints that were driven from Missouri; moved to Iowa in the spring of 1841; stayed there till the spring of 1846; in 1846 moved to Winter Quarters; in 1847 moved to Salt Lake Valley in the first company of pioneers; settled in Farmington, Davis Co.; was ordained counselor to Bishop Brownell; previously was a seventy; went to Fillmore in the spring of 1853, where he lived till his death.—Com.

At Ogden, Saturday, March 21st, MRS. JANE COMPTON, aged 52 years, 5 months and 6 days.

The deceased was born in Arkold, Nottinghamshire, England; baptized in 1853, and emigrated to Utah in August, 1870.—Ogden Junction, March 23.

At Mount Pleasant, March 21st, 1874, at 12:15 a.m., CAROLINE, daughter of Samuel and Harriett Allen, and wife of James C. Reynolds.

Deceased was born in Salt Lake City, November 19th, 1855; moved to Mount Pleasant with her parents in 1859; died as she had lived, a good faithful Latter-day Saint, and well beloved by all who knew her.—Com.

At Lehi, of old age, after a lingering sickness of some sixteen weeks, ALFRED BELL.

Deceased was born August 16th, 1794, in Rowan County, North Carolina; moved with his parents when one year old to Sumner County, Tennessee; volunteered into the service of the United States in 1814, under command of General Andrew Jackson; served in General Coffee's Brigade, Colonel Alcorn's Regiment, Captain John W. Burne's Company, Tennessee Volunteers; moved from Tennessee to Illinois in 1830; was baptized into the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, May 23rd, 1839, in Shelby County, by Elder L. T. Coons; moved to Nauvoo in 1840; was with the Church in its drivings, persecutions, etc., from Nauvoo; emigrated to Utah in 1851; moved to Lehi about the same year; had been a resident here ever since; was a justice of the peace for Lehi precinct for many years; was firm in the principles of truth, bore a faithful testimony to the last, and died with a glorious hope of a resurrection with the just.—Com.
