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LAW AND MORALITY MOVEMENT.

The citizens' reform meeting, held in the Methodist church last evening, was the most successful of the series. These meetings express a healthy sentiment, with which we are heartily in accord. The movement is one in which all citizens can join, the object being the cleansing of the municipal moral platter. If the agitation is vigorously maintained some good will be accomplished in suppressing the vice and lawlessness which have so alarmingly increased during the last year in this city.

The projectors of the meeting were too scrupulous about announcing it. The press was given only narrow publicity. It is a mistake also to maintain and to sit upon these gatherings having a political aspect, seeing that all good citizens are equally interested in their effect.

This political tint was given the meeting of last night by the chairman, C. E. Allen, who started off by making an apology for the city government and evading what might be regarded as an accusation. Seeing that the object of the meeting was to urge the officials to enforce the laws and thus suppress rampant crime and vice walking abroad at midnight, this position was incongruous as well as strictly untrue. Mr. Allen, in thus expressing himself, was not only out of harmony with the object of the meeting, but he intimated that the expression of the speakers at the former gathering were untrue. However, those who followed Mr. Allen indicated the faith of his position, the complaint being that the laws are not enforced, and that there is great laxity in the issuance of liquor licenses, and other legal permits.

This anomaly was the natural result of placing a professional politician to the chair. Mr. Allen computes his present office as county clerk by virtue of political frauds. This has been proved in the District Court, before Judge Anderson.

The genius of the political knocker dropped out when Mr. Allen said he was not in favor of criticizing the Ogden city government, because it got a weapon in the hands of "our political opponents." In giving expression to this opinion, he justified his made-in-a-primitive-manner attack that caused his "indiscretions." He announced to every person that the Ogden city government should not be criticized because of the formulation of this political weapon, even though it's conduct be such as to deserve censure. His reason was solely political, having no aspect of morality connected with it.

The speech of Mr. Wanless shows that he is not a politician, but a fearless advocate of truth and morality. He asserted that every promise that had been made by the "Liberal" candidates before the last city election had been shamefully violated, and the meeting had been called to protest against such outrages. Everybody in this city, including Mr. Allen, knows that the gentleman, Mr. Wanless, speaks the truth. This being the case there must also be a universally correct understanding of the nature of Mr. Allen's assertions, which were of a directly opposite character.

MINERAL PRODUCTS.

The United States produced 279,010,000 pounds of copper during the year 1889. This is a very large yield and considerably greater than the output for any preceding year. It is twenty per cent above the record of 1888, and is more than fifty per cent of the world's copper product of that year. Utah's contribution to this amount of copper was 80,000,000 pounds.

The quantity of lead is a little less than the first, for some cause not explained, being 187,000,000 lbs. of 2,000 pounds. Of this, Utah furnished 68,201,000 pounds.

The minor product of this Territory for 1889, as published by Wells Fargo & Co., was larger than the preceding year, being as follows:

Total export value \$ 18,000,000. Comparing the gold and silver of this year with that of 1888, and other metals of this value of the country, we find the value of the exports to be \$ 10,000,000.

This, we believe, is a larger amount than has been received in any preceding year, and is highly encouraging to the mining industries of the Territory.

PRODUCE THE PROPHET.

The press of the country is still repeating the story of a wholesale fugitive of the "Mormon" church. It is a positive feature of the "Mormon" question that, although no matter how bad the news may be, little sense there is in it, will be derived from paper to paper and treated as an unimportant fact, while the truth, no matter how plainly stated and how clear it is to

its foes, will be treated with cold neglect.

This Mexican cause is such an old and insidious story that its revival is really unnecessary. It looks as though the whole press of the country had no regard for reliability, when anything about the "Mormons" is concerned but simply wants to print something sensational.

In connection with this Mexican cause many papers are making this statement, which we now clip from the St. Louis Chronicle:

"An old article of Joseph Smith, the Mormon cause, which is still well remembered by the old-timers, presents the same difficulties that the Mormons would meet again in Utah, but would make their final settlement in Northern Mexico."

"More who have been published little bits at different times show us how who know something of the dimensions and possessions of the Mormons that they intend to fulfill this prophecy."

SURVEY OF CONFLICT IN RELIGION IN THIS COUNTRY.

Most public journals are expressing surprise at the number of organized religious bodies in the United States, as reported in the census of 1890. The official announcement is that there are one hundred and forty religious bodies in the United States, exclusive of many independent congregations. Probably the surplus would be greater if the census data were accurate, or more accurate than the present perception of it in the existing figures.

PROFITABLE SUGAR PRODUCTION.

The Santa Monica, Los Angeles County, Cal., outfit recently published an article giving the results of an extended experiment in the raising of sugar beets in that locality. The seeds were supplied by China Sprouts, up whom they were shipped direct from Honolulu. They were planted in the second week in March, and gathered and shipped to San Francisco on the 10th of July (last com.).

The results of the experiments are exhibited by the outfit with a view to inducing capitalists in the vicinity of Santa Monica to establish a sugar factory.
