CREAT BRITAIN. Progress of the insurrection.

LONDON, 9, 5 p. m.-There was desperate fighting around Paris on Saturday. Fort Valerien and the advanced batteries of the army of Versailles stead-ily bombarded Porte Maillot, their shells falling in the Champs Elysees. An engagement took place at Villejuif and there were skirmishes at Bagreux and Bellancourt. All the southern forts have resumed firing. The governforts have resumed firing. The government forces are gaining ground in front of Montrouge and Bicetre. A decisive struggle is expected at the gates of the city. It is reported that M. Thiers is averse to forcing an entrance into Paris by fighting, and that he prefers to reduce the city by investment. At ten o'clock, last night, the cannonade at Porte Maillot and other points continued with great violence. The Moniteur reports that Deliscase is under arrest; also that the ambulance service in Paris is insufficient, and the wounded are suffering greatly for want of proper attention. The recent decree of the Commune has been modified so as to make military service compulsory on all between the ages of nineteen and forty.
