Decapitate Bronze Lion in Front of Nassau Hall, Princeton.

Princeton, N. J., March 15.-One of the big bronze lions which guard the entrance of historic Nassau hall was so badly disfigured last night by a crowd of young alumni and upper classmen that it cannot be safely repaired. The contingent of students and graduates gathered together on the steps at a late hour to sing their class songs and engage in a little celebra-tion. During the jollification one of the big lions was beheaded and otherwise mutilated. The fragments were gathered up by the university proctor his morning.

The lions were presented to the niversity by the class of 1879, of which President Wilson is a member.
