## DISTRICT COURT HEARINGS.

In Anna D. Smith Sues City for \$5,000 for Injuries Received by a Fall.

Lecture by Dr. Talmage—Anderson-Tanner Nuptials—Fire in Methodist Parsonage.

In the Second district court the case of Anna D. Smith against Ogden City for \$5,000, alleged to be due for personal injury is being heard before Judge Tolpelt and the following jury: J. A. Dean, H. P. Randall, D. S. Tracy, P. F. Rollo, O. P. McCord, Edward Auth, and C. A. Ecklund. The plaintiff in the action claims that in December, 1899, she fell down while walking along on the sidewalk, which was in a slippery condition, breaking her arm and otherwise injuring her.

State of Utah vs. E. J. Weidell charged with assault with intent to do bodily harm, the defendant was arraigned and entered a plea of not guilty.

In the matter of the estate of Thos. Reed, petition for final discharge of administrator was heard and the clerk was appointed custodian of remainder of estate.

In the matter of the estate of Joseph Harrop, hearing on petition for confirmation of sale of property was continued to October 4th.

## W. A. KESLER SUICIDES.

After Several Unsuccessful Attempts He Finally Takes His Own Life.

Business in the District Court—Successful Fair in Third Ward—Postal Free Delivery Delayed.

Special Correspondence. Provo, Utah Co., Oct. 1.—About 9:30 o'clock last evening the sheriff's office was notified that a man had attempted suicide at the Grieg house, and County Physician Robinson was also notified and at once went to the hotel. The man, however, was deceased.

The man appears to be about 30 years of age, and so far as can be learned, he has been working for the Locomotive Bell Telephone company as a line-man from May last up to a few days ago. He came to the Grieg house Friday and has been acting as if sick most of the time, some of the guests noticing that he groaned and did not sleep well Monday night. He remained in his room all day yesterday. He left a new trunk containing clothing and a pocket book, with letters and cards of membership in various unions. One of the cards was from the Electrical Workers' International Brotherhood Union No. 4, Denver, certifying that W. A. Kesler was a member. Kesler was light complexioned, about 30 years of age, and about 6 feet in height. He is believed to have come from Texas. An empty morphine envelope bearing the label of Crawford, druggist, Mantle, was found in his room, and it is supposed his death resulted from morphine poisoning, although the doctor does not think the appearance of the corpse shows the symptoms usual in cases of morphine poisoning. Another peculiar feature is the letter from Kesler, which is published below. According to the time the letter is said to have been commenced the man must have commenced taking poison about twenty-four hours before death ensued. The "McF" referred to in the letter is probably A. J. McFarland, 50½ E. Second South street, Salt Lake City, room 5, as an envelope addressed as above was found in the trunk belonging to Kesler. The letter he left is quite well written with a pencil and is as follows:

Provo City, Utah, Oct. 1.—1:10 a. m.—CONCLUSION.

"I suppose it is the proper thing to make a record of one's self when you start the fool's part so I will not slight myself in that respect.

"It seems strange how easy it is to start a fool's part, but here I have been for something like four hours patiently awaiting for the final checking up and sign my release from this life. I feel the slightest regret in parting with earth's happiness as people term it, so there must certainly be something better in store for me.

"I do slightly regret leaving a few true friends behind but am truly confident that we will meet again.

"I would like to have the pleasure of once more grasping the hand of Jack McF, my partner, but that is out of the question, but will certainly meet him when he joins me in the new life where we can once more join hands in an eternal friendship.

"I do not suppose this act of mine will surprise those who know me, if they will think back as far as '91 they will remember a similar attempt and again in '98, once more in '99 and again last fall in Texas.

"I suppose I will make a success of the attempt for time though as I can see the time sheet and my time is made up in full and I feel the hand of destiny fast closing around me, and if the people will only give me a half hour longer it will be too late for them to try and interfere.

"I suppose I should write the folks a few lines, but they have heard so little of me of late that they will overlook the neglect. Well, as I am getting rather weak and can see no black demons waiting for me with outstretched hands to cause great fright which would cause me to cling to a wasted life, I will close.
