

GOV. SPARKS' NEWS IS SECOND HAND

Has Never Received a Copy of President's Letter That Papers Have Published.

SO HE RESERVES COMMENT.

In Message to Legislature Will Give His Reasons for Calling for Federal Troops.

Carson City, Nev., Jan. 13.—Gov. Sparks, in an interview this afternoon in regard to the criticism of the president relative to bringing troops to Nevada, said:

"I have never received a copy of the letter that is being published. No word such as is being quoted in the press has ever arrived in my office from President Roosevelt. Until I receive such word from the president, I will refrain from any public comment."

"In my message to the members of the legislature, which meets tomorrow, I will give my reasons for the action of calling on the president for troops. The message is being prepared this afternoon and will be made public when the legislature is organized for business."

The state board of assessors met with the governor today and the meeting is keeping him from considering other matters.

Practically all the members of the legislature of Nevada are in this city today to attend the special session called by Gov. Sparks, which convenes tomorrow morning.

Several members of the Goldfield chamber of commerce arrived in the city this morning and will remain during the session. They are in accord with the governor and believe that troops or some substitute of like nature is necessary to maintain peace in the southern camp. It is likely that a bill petitioning the federal government to establish barracks in this state will be presented, while there will also be a fight by the supporters of the governor to establish a troop of rangers on the plan adopted by Texas. Assemblyman Williams of Lincoln county will head this movement. Both sides will be ably represented in the fight for and against troops.

Sheriff Ingalls of Goldfield and President McKinnon of the Goldfield Miners' union, which are both on the scene, presumably in the interest of the union, it is understood that the testimony now being taken in the indictment proceedings at the United States district court will be used as a factor for and against the bills to be introduced in the legislature. The governor stated today that he hoped to see the matters adjusted inside of two weeks and that the matter would rest entirely with the action of the lawmakers as the president had only agreed to keep troops in the field pending the call of the legislature. It is his belief that the troops will be recalled almost immediately on the reviving of the body tomorrow.

GUILTY OF CONTEMPT

Subject Being a Rector, the Court Suspended Sentence.

New York, Jan. 13.—Rev. Canon William S. Chase, rector of Christ Episcopal church, Brooklyn, was today found guilty of contempt of court by Justice Marston of the New York state supreme court. The justice announced that in view of the fact that the accused was a rector, and as the court had no desire to humiliate him, sentence would be suspended.

Canon Chase was summoned before the court by order of the publication of an interview with him in which he questioned the legality of an injunction granted by the justice restraining the Brooklyn police from illegally interfering with the operation of the moving picture show on Sunday.

Perkins of Visalia. On Jan. 3 last Perkins and nine Mexicans were ambushed by Yaquis near the city of Sonora, Mexico, and massacred, but one Mexican escaping. Other particulars have not been received.

New York, Jan. 14.—For the first time in three seasons the ballroom in the residence of Mr. and Mrs. John Jacob Astor in Fifth avenue was thrown open last night, a theatrical entertainment being given there to about 300 guests. Previously there had been a dinner at which 50 persons were present. Arnold Daly and his company furnished the theatrical part of the entertainment, presenting the two one-act plays, "Van Dyke" and "The Shirkers." For two years Mrs. John Jacob Astor has been in mourning, following the death of her husband, Edward S. Willing, and has entertained but little.

TOO MANY ALIENS ARE UNDESIRABLE

Opinion of Congressmen Who Visited Europe Last Summer.

SOUTHERN LABOR INVOLVED.

More Workers Needed—Prohibitionists Against Bill to Make Production of Denatured Alcohol Easier.

Washington, Jan. 10.—Nearly all of the congressmen who were on the immigration commission which visited Europe last summer to study conditions in those countries are of the opinion that our laws should be strengthened so as to shut out more of the undesirable aliens endeavoring to come into the United States. Several bills have already been introduced on the subject, and a strong effort will be made to incorporate the best points into one measure. The congressmen interested more directly in this legislation think that the existing law should be required not only to read one language intelligently, but should on landing have not less than \$30 in money. Females should have not less than \$20. The head tax should also be increased from \$2 to \$5. Stricter examinations are also urged at the ports of embarkation in Europe both as to morals and health. Marine hospital service surgeons, they think, should be chief inspectors at the foreign ports and deputy inspectors employed who are not doctors.

LABORERS NEEDED IN THE SOUTH.

The southern states are reported to be in need of new settlers from any other section. Negro labor is now the main dependence. A large percentage of this is conceded to be the best in the world for the cotton fields and factories, but another large percentage of the blacks is ranked as unreliable. There is a tendency on the part to migrate north and west and to leave the plantations in Dixie for the cities and towns, where they can secure easier jobs, listen to bands play and take in cheap amusements after working for short periods. The south's cotton industry alone within a decade will need half a million additional men and women.

THE BIGGEST OF ITS KIND.

The government printing office, the biggest shop of its kind in the world, uses up 40 tons of paper in a day. This does not equal the amount this one newspaper combination in the United States requires, but it is the most extensive establishment by long odds maintained by a government. The book bindery, Uncle Sam's, the most wonderful thing in the plant, does not exist anywhere else on earth. Every sheet of paper used has to be strictly accounted for. It is a terrible load of responsibility upon the public printer, who has to give a heavy bond and receives for wearing out body and soul only \$5,500 a year. And yet there are probably hundreds of thousands of men in the land who would tackle the job for less money.

DENATURED ALCOHOL.

Representative Cary of the Milwaukee district has introduced in the house a bill which has a most promising sort of title, as follows: "To promote the production of the domestic industrial alcohol, increase the productive value of the land and maintain its fertile qualities through the establishment of small and scattered distilleries." Members of the ways and means committee who in the last Congress investigated carefully the denatured alcohol question are positive that when these distilleries are licensed by the government it will be one of the greatest of boons to the farmers of the United States. What is known as the wood alcohol trust has been opposing the proposed departure, claiming that frauds will be committed and that if the government permits one to manufacture the denatured stuff it will not be long before they will be turning out products that will be used on the sly by people who wish to go on howling drunk. Some of the leading men connected with the temperance organizations do not look with favor upon the scheme. They seem to be afraid that a roundabout way will be made to make spirits without having to pay the regular tax, and what they are fighting for is strict prohibition all over the land.

WORKS WELL BOTH WAYS.

This capital city has a hale, hearty old citizen of the name of Dr. William Starr, who has just celebrated his one hundredth birthday and feels as if he might live to see a dozen more. He attributes his long life and good health to the fact that he has never used tobacco. "Pshaw! That's nothing," said Congressman Floyd of Arkansas. "There used to be an old fellow in my district named Peter Mankins, who was born here in Washington and lived to be 114. During the last year of his life he checked up and found that he had long he had chewed tobacco, telling them he had used the weed for 99 years."

WHAT WILL HEART DO?

The politicians who assemble here are wondering what role William Randolph Hearst of New York and San Francisco will play in the next campaign. Few now believe that he will be a candidate for president on an Independence league ticket. Most of the Democrats thought a year ago that he intended running, but the consensus of opinion is that Hearst will not put his personal popularity to the test if Bryan is the candidate.

ATTEMPT TO REDUCE PULLMAN CAR RATES.

Washington, Jan. 13.—George S. Loftus of St. Paul, accompanied by Senator La Follette, filed with the interstate commerce commission today a petition asking for a reduction of 25 per cent in the lower berth rates of the Pullman company and the fixing of the rates for upper berths at one-half that of the lower berth. The reduction is asked on all interstate business throughout the United States. Mr. Loftus represents the Minnesota shippers' association, which started the private car investigation two years ago, and he has had the advice and support of Senator La Follette.

Six months ago a complaint was made against the Pullman company in regard to rates from northwestern points. A hearing was had at St. Paul, at which representatives of the company refused to produce its books or to answer questions. This resulted in a postponement of the hearing. In the meantime the shippers' association broadened its inquiry, with the result that this petition was filed today. The petition avers that the Pullman company has invested \$28,000,000, while it is capitalized for \$125,000,000, and its net earnings are approximately 20 per cent per annum on the capitalization, in

addition to a surplus, and that each car, accepting the company's estimate of its cost, pays for itself every two years.

"Because of the unreasonable rates charged and the abnormal revenue resulting," the petition declares, "the Pullman company is so powerful that it now controls the sleeping car business of the United States and is so arrogant that it denies the right and power of the government to inquire into its earnings or to regulate its business."

A BRAVADO IN DEATH.

Deming, N. M., Jan. 13.—Martin Amador was hanged in the county jail here today for the murder of Concepcion Mendoza, with whom he was in love. He went to his doom without the least evidence of fear, smoking a cigarette until the sheriff was ready to adjust the black cap. Magdaleno Saballos, who was to have been hanged at the same time as Amador for killing a child in an attempt to shoot the man he thought had won his sweetheart, had his sentence commuted to life imprisonment.

KILLED IN RUNAWAY.

Spokane, Wash., Jan. 13.—While Herbert Farnum of Hillyard was driving near Mead this morning a whiff of trouble broke and his horses ran away, dragging him over the dashboard. Death was instantaneous, his neck being broken. Farnum was married last New Year's day to Miss Hattie Turner.

EX-SENATOR WILSON ILL.

Tacoma, Wash., Jan. 13.—A special to the News says former Senator John L. Wilson is seriously ill at Seattle and will leave for Baltimore the latter part of the week for an operation by a specialist.


