At Ephraim, Sanpete Co., December 17th, from cancer on the face, after a long and great suffering, Ex-Bishop Caleb Gibbons Edwards.

Deceased being the Major of the first battalion of Silver Greys, Sanpete Military District, N. L., was buried on the 18th, with military honors, with Col. R. N. Alfred as manager of the procession. Before starting, a hymn was sung by the Ephraim Choir.

Capt. L. Larson's company of cavalry took the lead, followed by Capt. A. Hendrickson's company of infantry, and the martial band under George Quinn; succeeded by a great concourse of the people of Ephraim, and a few distinguished citizens from other places condoling with the mourners.

Several salutes were fired by the companies at the interment, and much respect was paid to the remains of Bishop Edwards by the people of Ephraim.—Com.
