"Resolved, That this conference recom-mend that the academic authorities of this conference hold themselves as ultimately responsible for the conduct of athletics within their respective institutions. "Resolved, That it is recommended that the executive committee of the permanent organization take cognizance among other things of the vital questions of elisibility of students who take part in athletic games and sports and report as early a time as practicable to themselves on rules and recommendations for the conduct of all such matters. Society of College Gymnasium Directors Discusses Various Questions.

New York, Dec. 20,-The Society of Col-lege Gymnasium Directors concluded its annual conference yesterday. Dr. Raycroft of the University of Chi-

annual conference yesterday. Dr. Raycroft of the University of Chi-cupo read a paper collided, "The Essen-tials and Technique of the Physical Ex-amination for Competitive Athletics." He demonstrated that the proper ex-amination of the young man about to take part in college sports was one of vital importance at the present day especially when so many had ambitions toward ac-tive competition. A majority of the di-rectors, he contended, at the smaller col-leges, paid all their attention to the con-ditions of the heart while it was just as important that they should likewise attend to the condition of the kidneys. As a rule, physical exercise taxes the kid-neys to a great extent, and they are call-ed on to throw off an amount of waste for which they are entirely incapable, and this functional over-exertion fre-ouently culminates in the collapse of the youthful athlete. 
