

running at large, Chap. XLI, Revised Ordinances: Sec. 2-No cattle, horses, mules, sheep, goats or hogs shall be allowed to run at large within the limits of this city, and all such animals, so found, may be taken up by any person and driven to the pound, and he owner of said animal shall be liable to pay a fine in any sum not exceeding \$10 for each animal.
