BIG CELEBRATION WAS SUCCESSFUL

The Afternoon Events of Labor Day's Doings Interesting.

AT SALT PALACE GROUNDS.

Electrical Workers Won Ball Game From the Sheet Metal Workers By Score of 8 to 3.

The afternoon events of Labor day's celebration were successfully carried out, as was the morning parade. The day was clear and beautiful from morning until night, and the entire town turned out, for it was a national holiday; all places of business were closed up, and the resorts were well patronized for it was the last day of the season with them. The great center of attraction was the Salt Palace grounds, where the athletic events were pulled off without a hitch.

The first event was the 100-yard dash, won by E. W. Lundahl, who received \$5. J. Munson was second and got \$2. In the 50-yard dash Elmer Pratt was winner and John Elton second. For boys under 12 years old a 50-yard race was arranged. Richard Roberts was the first over the tape and Will Anderson got second money. A humorous number was the 100-yard dash for men weighing 200 pounds or more. Charles Fenstermaker won, with H. A. Ryan in close pursuit.

In the race for married women Mrs. Oldfield won, with Mrs. Dashiway second.

Miss Mae Elton won the race for single women, and Miss Lila Hoffer was a close second.

Other events and their winners were as follows:

Fifty yards for men of 110 pounds or less—H. Welsh, first; W. Clemens, second.

Fifty-yard race for girls under 12 years—Palm Agatha, first; Esther Gunderson, second.

Fifty-yard race for girls between 12 and 16 years—Dodie Gates, first, and Ada Davis, second.

The baseball game was won by the Electrical Workers over the Sheet Metal Workers by a score of 8 to 3, winning the \$50 prize.

The tug of war between the electric linemen and the boiler-makers was hotly contested, and won by the electricians in 24 minutes. Then the victors went in to try and beat the structural iron workers. But the latter pulled the electricians off their feet in five minutes.

The winners also pulled the boiler-makers over the line, and captured the first prize, the second going to the electrical workers. There was no disorder during the entire day, and everything passed off pleasantly.

This Federation of Labor issued a souvenir of the day, in a booklet containing the following statement from President J. N. Spaulding of the Federation:

"While existing labor conditions in Salt Lake are fairly good, there still remains room for improvement. Especially does this apply to unskilled labor. This class of workmen are slow to recognize the value of organization, being ignorant of the good to be derived from same, and unaware that in their unorganized state they are at the mercy of the employer. With the skilled or organized classes, wages are about on a par with those paid in other cities. The eight-hour day is now well established in all of the building trades and we hope that this time is not far off when it will be established with all classes of labor. However, we can expect this only when the working men are thoroughly organized. There has been very little friction during the past few years between capital and labor. Work has been plentiful, the only drawback being an extreme scarcity of brick. Taking the labor unions in Salt Lake as a whole, it may be said they are doing good, consistent work, each year improving and becoming stronger, not only in number, but in principle as well. They are demonstrating to the public—a public the majority of which it is to be feared, have been prejudiced against unionism—that they are organized for the benefit of all mankind."

Whether or not the trouble at the dance had anything to do with the report that the deputy was "shooting up" the town is not known at this time.

KILLED BY UTAH MAN.

Unfounded Jealousy Prompts Warren T. Fenn to Slay Robert Klein.

Word comes from Nampa, Idaho, that Warren T. Fenn, formerly of Provo, attacked a fellow laborer, Robert Klein, with a shovel and beat him to death. The killing occurred in a brick-yard, where the two men were employed. Fenn is in jail, having surrendered shortly after the terrible deed, and is penitent and remorseful for his act. Jealousy, for which he now admits he had no cause, is said to have prompted the deed.

Fenn is 39 years old, has a wife and six children, and has always borne a good reputation. He was born at Provo, and lived there until a short time ago, when he went to Idaho to work. He is a brother-in-law of John S. Rollo, supreme court stenographer, and his mother, Mrs. Martha Fenn, resides in this city. The wife of Fenn was Miss Stella James before her marriage, 16 years ago. Mrs. William Twelves and Mrs. S. J. Jones of Provo, and Mrs. E. M. Brown of American Fork, as well as Mrs. Rollo, are sisters of Fenn. Little is known here of Fenn's victim, except that he was about 50 years old and an Odd Fellow.
