LONDON, Feb. 12.—William Gladstone presented to the world today a speech which has been paralleled in its history. Weighed down with the burden of 55 years, a man whose name is in the hearts of all in their country, he spoke in the House of Commons to introduce his long looked-for measure for Irish home rule. He spoke for two hours, and James Harcourt of the United States Senate, in conversation with Gladstone's secretary, declared that the entire speech was a masterpiece and the greatest the most beautiful in his career.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—In the whisky trust investigation today Greenhut, chairman of the defense, entered a protest against inquiry into the affairs of the company.
