CORRESPONDENCE.

Utah Weather, Health and Peace—More Irrigation—Schools—Factory—Shooting, etc.

ST. GEORGE, Dec. 9, 1877.

Editors Deseret News: The weather in these valleys continues mild and sunny, and when frost has crusted the ground at night, the morning sun has soon dispelled it, and thus far the "beautiful" day has been a stranger here.

The health of the people is much improved, and as present no ailment prevails that we hear of. Ours is a quiet rural town, and little of bustle or excitement is seen. Today a stranger here remarked that it seemed like a "Sunday town."

The citizens here have determined to open more land to cultivation, and organized to open the old Virgin ditch, by which some 500 or more acres will be capable of irrigation and cultivation.

A new settlement has been commenced, the past season, south, on the Virgin, at the place known as "Mesquite Flats," where about 1,000 acres of arable land lies in one body and is fine for vineyards and fruit.

Action has been taken by the authorities of the four school districts comprised to the city limits and a consolidation effected, for the purpose of being able, conjointly, to keep up here, at least a part of the year, a better grade of school than the common district, and already we have begun to realize the fruits of such action. Miss Mary Cook, from your city, a lady thoroughly qualified and of no ordinary reputation as a teacher, has been employed for the winter, and already the school has been opened and a goodly number of advanced pupils registered.

Besides this, there is a district school in each of the four wards.

In Washington they have a large and commodious two story school-house, with a fine toned bell in the tower, the best school-house in the county.

The Washington factory also shows a much improved financial condition, under the energetic management of Bishop Jones, and contrary to all present expectations, a ten per cent dividend has been declared, to be paid to stockholders, with a handsome reserve fund. The store rooms are well stocked with goods to supply the people in these southern valleys and some to spare for our northern neighbors.

Col. Hardy to-day started for Beaver, with a prisoner charged with having shot at a fellow miner. We believe his name is Dame, a miner.

The evening before last, just at dark, we witnessed with sublime admiration the grand spectacle of the passage of the moon over the face of the evening star, Venus, we believe. Whoever failed to witness the phenomena missed a beautiful sight.
