Captured. San Francisco, Nov, 22.—At 6 o'clock this morning a lone bandit wearing a polica dot mask and another who later gave his name as John P. Smith of Sacramento, entered a saloon on Stuart street in this city. Several men were in the saloon at the time and Smith covered them with a pistol and lined them up against the wall. Ho then robbed Victor Mattson, the bar-tender, and rified the cash register. The robber they backed out of the saloon and ran. Mattson grabbed a pistol and ran after him, firing a shot. Two policemen came to his as-sistance, and a running fight between the robber and police ensued. Smith was shot in the mouth by a builtet from Officer Davit's pistol and then he surrendered.
