## THE CHURCH CASES.

On this the second day of the January term of the Territorial Supreme Court all the judges were in their places on the bench when the session Justice Metritt, Associate Justices
Bartch, Smith and King. Clerk
Bache read the minutes of Monday iast, which were now approved and signed.

Clerk Joseph P. Bache, who on October 6th, 1894, was appointed by this court as special master to take testimony in the matter of the petition of Attorney Arthur Brown, asking for compensation in the sum of \$1,000 for legal services rendered to the late receiver of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Frank H. Dyer, now deceased) presented his report thereon this morning.

The special master found, and so gave his opinion, that the services referred to "were rendered by the petitioner to the late receiver, as such receiver, and uot to him in his personal matters."
The testimony further showed, he stated, that those services were worth \$1,000.

District Attorney Judd, as representing the United States, and Attorney F. S. Richards, representing the late corporation of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and Re-ceiver John R. Winder, now put in a type-written protest, objecting to the court taking any action upon the report of Special master Bache under the petition of Mr. Brown, filed May 14, 1894, or under the order of this court made upon petition at the June term, 1894, for the following reasons: 1st That the said petition is a proceeding nnknown to the forms of law and to the practice of this court. 2nd, That said petition shows upon its face that this court, at a former term, after a hearing upon the matters set up in the petition, denied any relief to the patitioner, by an order made and entered in this court to that effect, which order still remains in full force and effect. Inat the parties interested in contesting the matteract up in said petition were not made parties to the same, and have not been served by the petitioner with a copy of the petition or with any copy of the order of the court made thereon, and they have had no opportunity make any defense to the matters set up in said petition.

Attorney Brown conducted his own case and set forth in substance the facts contained in his original petition. He stated that the services were reudered to the late receiver (Frank H. Dyer) in the latter's official capacity; that the petition was subsequently presented to the Supreme Court, with Judge Zane as chief justice, and denied by au order made and entered after the court had adjourned. Petitioner also insisted tnat Judge Zane's order in the matter was pull and void, to asmuch as prior to going upon the beuch he had been engaged in the Church cases.

At Monday's session of court it was stated that the sum of \$2,295.25 in excess of the amount (\$1,000) which Receiver Winder was previously authorized to expend upon repairs to the Gardo House had been laid out by The report of the receiver was bim. presented to their honors and referred,
