Warm Weather—The Temple—Conference.

ST. GEORGE, June 5, 1874.

Editor Deseret News:

The weather here is warm and sultry, not as agreeable as the beautiful winter weather. Thermometer now ranges from 90° to 100° in the shade. From this on during the summer out door work is not very agreeable. Still our Temple is slowly but gradually increasing its walls in height. Bro. Parry informs me that the string course and sills are now on the west end and south side, and I notice the heavy poles for scaffolding are being raised on the north and east, and the Temple can now be seen from almost all parts of this valley, as the site it is located on is a rather central high piece of land, and which some day we hope will be the centre of our city.

The city is unusually lively this morning, many brethren being in from the surrounding settlements, to attend Conference, which was called to order this morning at 10 a.m., by President Robt. Gardner (President John W. Young being absent on business) and opened with prayer by Henry Herriman. The speakers this forenoon were bishops Robinson, Crosby and McArthur, and Pres. Gardner, their remarks being principally based on the United Order.

This afternoon meeting opened with prayer by J. Gates. After singing, Bishop Bunker delivered an excellent discourse on the principles of unity and co-operation in the U. O.

The spirit of our Conference thus far bespeaks a good time for the following two days. Still many regret the absence of our President, as we here, as elsewhere, like to have our leaders with us to guide and instruct in the ways of life.

Nine thousand feet of lumber arrived here this morning from Mt. Trumbull mill for the Temple.

Organization—Crops Injured—The Marshal Crusade and the Reason for It.

FAIRVIEW, Sanpete Co., June 10th, 1874.

Editor Deseret News:

A branch of the United Order has been organized at this place and the following officers elected—President, Bishop Amasa Tucker; 1st Vice President, John Cox, Sen.; 2d Vice President, Philip Hurst; Secretary, Henry W. Sanderson; Assistant Secretary, Frederick Christensen; Treasurer, Wm. Christensen; directors, Andrew Nielsen, O. L. Terry, Archibald Anderson, Peter N. Hansen, Jordan Brady.

The Spring has been cold and our crops are getting a late start. It appears at the present that crops will be light, as the cut worms are damaging our grain and have eaten up our garden vegetables almost entirely. Some of us are apt to think that we are the most afflicted people in this little settlement, that could be found in the mountains, having been on the frontiers during the Indian war, suffered seriously during the grasshopper war, and have been visited by more deputy marshals and small beer cases than any other settlement, that we know. This last visitation has been brought upon us by an individual that is well known as the man that lives upon the interest of his indebtedness, false pretensions and rascality, and generally has sworn vengeance upon the town because the people would not hold him in fellowship unless he would take a more honorable course.

It is thought that the origin of the marshal crusade here was to hinder us in the securing of our land by taking the money from us that was being saved up for that purpose, as it has been remarked, by certain parties, accompanied by a wink and a nod, that if that drain continued a little longer, we would not be able to pay for our land in time. It is very probable that ere long there will be cases of fraud in land matters in this region made public and investigation entered into.

Mr. J. V. Bogert, Secretary and Treasurer of the late Yellowstone Expedition, issues his call for a new organization. He says: "A party of 200 or 300 Crow warriors is about to

go out against the Sioux, and at least 125 of the late command are anxious to return to the Big Horn country. If we go rightly to work we may yet recover the ground the committee has reason to know has been lost; and, if we do so, it is necessary to reorganize immediately. We therefore call for instant enrollment of all who desire to take advantage of the efforts the committee is making to insure a successful expedition. We are now expecting valuable assurances of support and assistance, which will be made public at the proper time, and in the meantime we ask all who wish to join us to send in their names and data without delay."

At Smithfield, Cache Co., on Wednesday, June 3, after an illness of twelve days, of inflammation of the lungs, GENE HUNK, wife of Andrew Toolson, aged 41 years, 5 months and 23 days.

Deceased was born in Bornholm, Denmark, Nov. 15th, 1827; baptized in 1853; emigrated to Utah from Denmark in 1859; was a good, faithful Latter-day Saint, and leaves behind a husband and six young children; was an active member of the Relief Society, and had given in contribution to the United Order.—Com.
