EXTRACT.

HEAD QUARTERS, Department of Utah,) CAMP FLOYD, U.T., May 10, 1859.

TO HIS EXCELLENCY A. CUMMING, GOVERNOR OF UTAH TERRITORY:

SIR: "If persons, desirous of emigrating from the Territory,

could assemble at a given time and place with their families, trains, stock, etc., complete protection, by a special escort, could be given them; and should I be notified by any considerable number, of such intention, I will furnish the force for the protection.
