**TERRITORIAL DISPATCHES.****Murder at Tokerville.**

The following is a copy of a telegram received, by Deseret Telegraph line, at the office of President B. Young, this morning:

"TOKERVILLE, March 16.

"President B. Young:

"Richard Fryer shot his wife and baby and Thomas Batty, about 7 o'clock this morning. His wife is dead; the others are dangerously wounded. The sheriff killed Fryer in taking him; he was well armed and would not surrender. He was in a rock house, and threatened death if he was molested. Fryer has been subject, for some time, to fits of insanity, but had appeared of late to have recovered, and was at work yesterday plastering. He had since driven his wife from home. When the sheriff went to take him he told him to keep away, as he was the Lord."

Mr. Batty Dead.

"TOQUERVILLE, March 17.

Batty, shot yesterday by Fryer, died at 1:30 p.m. to-day. Fryer's child still lingers, but its death is momentarily expected. The child is six months old, and was shot by Fryer in the breast while in bed with its mother, who was also shot through the head while in bed by him. Batty was engaged in making a fire when Fryer entered the door; on Batty's turning around he was shot twice, one ball entering the left eye, and the other striking directly under the right. Fryer then entered another room and there shot his wife and child. Fryer remained in Batty's house till shot by the Sheriff's posse. Mrs. Batty, who was in the house during the time, was not molested by Fryer.

**Another Death by Snow Slide.**

LOGAN, March 17, 5 p.m.

This morning, while Ezra J. Clark and his two sons, Cyrus and Justus, were working in Logan canyon, four miles from Logan, they were caught in a snow slide, carrying Justus about a hundred yards and buried him in snow. The father was carried a short distance, but escaped injury. Cyrus caught hold of a tree and also escaped unhurt. The latter immediately went to Logan to give the alarm, and the father commenced digging and hunting for Justus. About fifty men on horseback, with shovels, soon arrived, one after the other, and after about twenty or thirty minutes digging, he was found buried two feet deep under the snow. Life was extinct. A coroner's inquest will be held this p.m.

**Death of S. M. Blair.**

Seth M. Blair died this afternoon.

**Four Men Buried in a Snowslide.**

BINGHAM, March 17.

A snow-slide occurred at the head of Carr Fork, at four o'clock this a.m., burying four men. It was supposed that all four were killed, but after ten hours digging three of the men were found alive, and one dead. Two of the men, buried under thirty feet of snow in an old tunnel, were taken out uninjured; their names are C. Smith and F. Kayser. The other two lived in a cabin further up the gulch. One of them, Larry Nowlan, was killed in his bunk; the other, Frank Lenny, was saved by getting in a tunnel back of the cabin. He was badly hurt. Nowlan's body was brought to Bingham. The slide came down the canyon one mile and a half, and was from thirty to seventy feet deep in places.

**A Family Buried by a Snow-slide.**

OGDEN, 18th.

A snow slide at Liberty, in Ogden Valley, yesterday morning, at eight o'clock, destroyed one house occupied by a family of six persons, by the name of Burt; five of them were finally taken out badly hurt. A little child had not been found up to four o'clock yesterday afternoon.

**A Nation Born in a Day.**

ST. GEORGE, March 19.

Editor Deseret News:

The entire tribe of the Sheebit Indians, numbering one hundred and forty-seven, with the exception of a few who are lame and were

unable to come, were baptized here to-day. They came from the Sheebit mountains, about seventy miles south of this place, and requested baptism of their own accord. Mr. C. R. Savage, of Salt Lake City, got several good pictures of the ceremony.

**DECEASED.**

In the 16th Ward, Salt Lake City, March 21st, in the 77th year of her age, EUPHEMIA, relict of Geo. Reid, sen., of old age. She had suffered from partial paralysis for the eight years preceding her death. She died in the faith of the gospel, and in the hope of a glorious resurrection.—Com.
