Last Night's Despatches.

CONGRESSIONAL.

SENATE.

Assignment of Territorial Judges—
Territorial Railroad Bill.

WASHINGTON, 8.—At the expiration
of the morning hour the Senate
resumed the consideration of
bills on the calendar. The House
bill providing for the assignment of
Territorial Judges was recom-
mended.

The Senate bill for the incorpo-
ration of railroads in the Territories
was read, and Stewart explained
the provisions, saying its object was
to enable the people of the Terri-
tories to build railroads with their
own money, without applying to
Congress or the Territorial legisla-
ture for aid, and that it would
public lands except for depots and
right of way.

Carpenter gave notice that he
would call up his Louisiana elec-
tion bill on Monday next, and ex-
pressed a hope that it would be ac-
cepted upon without reference to a com-
mittee.

Wright moved to recommend the
bill for the incorporation of Terri-
torial railroads to the committee on
railroads, pending the discus-
sion on the motion the Senate went
into executive session, and soon
after adjourned.

HOUSE.

Public Works, Eight-Hour Law—
Currency Question.

WASHINGTON, 8.—Pratt, from the
committee on public buildings, re-
ported a bill giving the Secretary
of the Treasury discretionary power
to defer or suspend the payment of
public works authorized but not yet
commenced; referred, on a
point of order, to a committee of
the whole.

Killinger, from the same com-
mittee, reported, in reference to the
alleged violation of the eight-hour
law by the New York post office,
that the law is observed with the
government employees, but in con-
tract work there is no way of en-
forcing it.

On the suggestion of Cox, who
believed the law was not enforced
anywhere on government work,
the testimony was ordered printed
and the committee discharged from
the further consideration of the
matter.

Woodward, from the civil ser-
vice reform committee, reported a
bill prohibiting the payment of the
government receiving anything from
the United States beyond their
salary, and actual necessary
traveling expenses when on gov-
ernment business.

Dawes offered an amendment
prohibiting such officers using the
labor of employees of the United
States for private purposes, and
the morning hour expired and the bill
went over, and the consideration of
the currency bill was resumed.

On an advocate of it and enlarg-
ing upon the point and advan-
tages of a paper currency.

Townsend opposed the bill, as
fraught with evil.

Beck opposed it, and favored a
greenback currency, and was re-
fused to the government, cus-
tomers as well as any other.

Beck's speech was a fearful thing to
hear. He was informally agreed to hold an
evening session for debate, in five
minute speeches. The pre-
vious question is to be seconded on
the bill at the close of the session.

At the evening session only a few
members who had speeches made
were present.

EASTERN.

Very Cold Weather.

CHICAGO, 8.—The weather is ex-
tremely cold, almost unprecedented
for the season of the year.

Mail Coach Robbed.

GALVESTON, 8.—The mail coach
running between San Antonio and
Austin was robbed last night, the
passengers, however, were not harm-
ed, and all their jewelry and money, about
\$2,000 in all; the mail bags were also
robbed.

\$40,000 Fire.

CLEVELAND, 8.—The Forest City
Variety and Naphtha Works were
burned to-night, loss \$40,000.

Will Oppose the Convention Bill.

WASHINGTON, 8.—The Republi-
can Legislative caucus, this
morning, agreed to oppose the cen-
tennial appropriation bill and the
bill to increase the debt of Philadel-
phia on the republican majority in
the House agree to pass a fair ap-
propriation bill for the city.

NEW ORLEANS, 8.—Serious dam-
age is apprehended in the city from
the overflowing of the river, which
has broken over the levee in several
places; a break has occurred in
the levee below Carrollton, and the

zen of this place, shot and killed
himself at 10 o'clock to-day.

nothing was accomplished.

a new trial to-day.

WASHINGTON NOTES.

Out of the twelve appropriation
bills, Congress has only one out of
the way, that of fortifications.
Other bills awaiting disposition are
the army and navy, the legislative,
judicial and executive appropriat-
ions, the pension, Indian and mili-
tary academy, the post office, the
river and harbor, the sundry civil,
the consular and diplomatic, and the
deficiency appropriation. The
general appropriation bill, with all
these bills to be disposed of, as well

matters to the country. Congress
will not be able to adjourn before
some time early in August.
