## FOR DELEGATE TO CONGRESS.

If harmony and enthusiasm are any measure of heat, and fighting through the campaign which is to follow, the people of this Territory have a right to expect a political battle royal in every election district and county up to the closing of the polls on the evening of November 6th; for the Democratic convention in this city on Saturday was quite as prompt, unanimous and demonstrative in making the party's candidate, as were the Republican delegates at Ogden a few days earlier in naming theirs. Hon. Joseph A. Rawlins was selected, such an oration and testimonial as could not but gratify the most stolid, and whatever may be the result of the contest, now fairly begun, he was given the most complete endorsement of the confidence, esteem and esteem of his party.

The rival political hosts will thus be led by the same standard-bearers as two years ago. Of course there have been many changes during that period. The lines have been drawn closer; some changes of front have occurred; many who were then engaged are now regularly interested in the ranks on one side of the other, and—more important than any of these—a strong and active party which at that time had its candidate and its working organization, has since given out of business altogether. The political situation is exceedingly simplified; in this extent; for though there will probably be a popular candidate named, it is hardly to be expected that his following will be large enough this time to cut any particular figure in the returns.

The two candidates—widely different as they are in politics and consequently in views as to what policy is the better for the people of Utah—they have some happy attributes in common. Both are good Utah men; both are worthy Utah men; both are capable and enterprising as speakers, and willing and patriotic as workers for Utah's welfare. Both have the vigor and hopefulness of youth, and neither lacks the personality and intellect that give men prestige and respect among their colleagues. It is a satisfaction, therefore, in which all can partake, that, although one of them must now unavoidably be defeated, the people will have a trusted and worthy representative in the other. This thought need do away with none of the energy and zest with which the followers of either shall work for the success of the man of their choice; but it should go toward healing the wounds of defeat. If one cannot always succeed in getting the candidate one prefers, it is some consolation to have at least the alternative satisfaction of having the candidate who next to one's own, would be most warmly approved.

## DIPLOMAT, NOT WARRIOR.

The latest news from China make it evident that the victory of Li Hung Chang is not in as high favor during a time of war as he was when the Bowery Kingdom was at peace. This information is not at all surprising; it is those who believe otherwise that the sentiment Mongolian's career. As a diplomat, both in domestic and foreign affairs, China has not had his equal since the internal workings of the empire have been known to Western civilization. In the various fortunes of the nation, he became premier, Li Hung Chang has shown his shrewdness and courage in diplomatic relations with foreign nations as well as in keeping his people together at home. But with the anti-Mongolian sentiment in the United States for decades, he set about creating a way of existence for his countrymen in America, and was successful in his plan with Mexico. And he had had his own way in regard to China, the Japanese troops there would not have amounted to anything. His policy two years ago was in the case of the small kingdom, a Chinese province, and against the royal family of Korea by a Chinese government; but his plan was not approved, and the result is known.

Of late Li Hung Chang's power has been slipping from him, owing to the jealousy of some members of the royal household and others. He has had his plan with a new group which has operated secretly. These have removed the salt, that the money, while the remainder is spent for existence by peaceful political methods, is not a warrior. Whatever he has attempted to do in a

military campaign before failed. He has married politicians, and by his cunning and astuteness manipulated them to his liking. But he has none of the shrewd administrative power which marks the successful warrior; therefore when the Chinese emperor directed him to take personal command of the campaign with Japan, the example of the victory secured a victory by placing on him a burden he could not carry. However, that was not the case; that was, not to have the courage with the military officers. In this he was overruled, and being accused of being a gambler, he, failing as a warrior, when he is not, is beaten.

## IN SILENCE A-SILE.

A serious conference has been opened recently in a New York paper concerning the remunerations of consulting engineers. It was started, we see, by the famous Gustav Lindenthal, who recited the difficulties, clear and under certain circumstances, the best thing a consulting engineer can do is to have no fee at all.

Now the discussion before this session, concerning this particular article, while others denounce it in strong terms, judging from the voluminous correspondence published, the subject must have excited considerable interest among the public, and interesting paragraphs taken as an evidence that the philosophy of the subject has been sufficiently discussed to have a flavor still on this age, though reasonably to expect, considering the high profession of administration for the incorporated, better readings of the Founder of Christianity.

That engineers and other schools of industry should teach the world to consult, bearing their usual charges, is no change, for what can a human being expect that in the judgment of such moral leaders, it is well to do, as they contend, there be no absolute Judge of the living and the dead, whose decrees are founded on eternal justice, and if made life be ended with his last breath on earth, vanishing as the vapor that finds in the air, there can easily be seen.

This means a moral condition of man opposed to the laws of his Creator, Father and Son, and the violation of these laws, "this is an imputation where there is no law" is correct. New Testament doctrine, and the cause of the Divine law, logically leads to the conclusion that the word sin is not an empty phrase, and that "sin" destruction, therefore, may sometimes be a virtue. Such virtues are natural to humanity.

Those who evince outside signs that man had no sin in causing here and should not be denied the right to leave the earth when he feels so inclined. They hold that when sickness and infirmities are account of age and infirmities, man is in duty to end the earthly existence so as to continue his efforts to follow man; all of which reasoning is wrong both in premises and conclusions.

The subject assumes a wholly different aspect when viewed in the light of reason and the teachings of the Gospel. In the first place, man is not an earth by chance or accident. His presence here is part of a Divine plan necessary for the development of the universe. The earth was not peopled until after Adams' creation in the assembly of the Almighty. To end this existence short is an act of rebellion against this Divine plan. Further, it is not true that life was given us without our choice. When man lives in the eternal regions before this world was born of chaos may longest form a part of life we ultimately reach the truth results in that when the foundations of mortality, hydration were laid, all the children of that region over the opportunity to receive immortality and an existence here, life, then, is a sacred trust, voluntarily accepted. To cut off by suicide is to betray this trust, to violate commands enacted above all others.

There can be no doubt that every individual needs the whole of his life with as a preparation for eternity. Only by faithfully attending to their duties here, whatever they may be, can human beings attain perfection of character necessary for a continuation of a life to happiness in eternity. One who takes himself in very much in the position of a student who should run away from school from the institute where he has been placed, leaving parents to perfect his education, and render him capable of discharging his duties as a student. And the consequences will be the wrong, the foolishness and the evil consequences of such conduct are correspondingly when applied to temporal matters, but who can measure the depth thereof when eternity is concerned?

Who can say that poverty, sickness, infirmity and various painful experiences are not also necessary for the probation of those who wish to meet them? It is perfectly conceivable that the applying of these things is applied to living persons, in order to bring out qualities of humility, sympathy, trust in God, etc., without which it is impossible to fit the soul of the person for salvation.
