Geo. Middlemas of Cal. Dead.



Yesterday he called on President Smith to whom he spoke highly of Utah's representatives at the University of Michigan, stating that all who had studied there had been regarded by the faculty and their fellow students as a superior class of young men and a class who, by their carnest efforts, had won laurels at the institu-

Byron Cummings, who is doing everything possible for his entertainment
while he remains here. The visitors are
much impressed with the city and its
surroundings and after leaving here

The Archaeological Institute now The Archaeological Institute now numbers over 4,000 members. Its object is to carry on researches in archaeology and to disseminate the knowledge gained. The principal work at present is being done in Grecce, Later there will be work in Asia Minor. It is the desire to devote more attention to American archaeology in the future. The insti-tute publishes books which are sent to the members and a magazine, which is sent free, also. In addition to this, lecturers are sent out, without charge to the local branches except actual ex-

penses of hall, lights, etc. In a large number of instances, no tably in Detroit, the meetings of the society are largely social in their na-ture. NO NEGRO QUESTION.

Georgia Man Says It is a Thing of The Past in His State.

Frank M. Potts, of Atlanta, Ga., who is at the Knutsford, says that there is really no negro question in the south, and that the blacks give no trouble as voters in Georgia. So there is no exeuse for guns at the polls. He says: 'Most of the negroes and many of the whites have disfranchised themselves by their own carelessness and improvi-dence. The Constitution of 1877 prorided that no one should be allowed to vote who had not paid his poll-taxes of \$1.50 per year. The shiftless and Improvident of both races have surrendered the franchise rather than pay the tax, and for that reason only about half the adult male population of Georgia can vote. Many are from ten to fifteen years in arrears, and there is small likelihood that they will pay up the full amount merely to get the privilege of voting."
