GRAND POLITICAL RALLY.

LAST NIGHT'S MEETING IN OGDEN .-MONDAY NIGHT'S RALLY AT THE THEATRE.

The political mass meeting of the People's Party, in the Ogden Tabernacle last evening, was the grandest rally of the kind ever held in that city, and one of the largest in the history of the Territory. The commodious building was jammed to its utmost capacity, and a large crowd was unable to gain admittance. The speakers were Hon. John T. Caine, the People's candidate for Delegate to Congress, who will be elected on Tuesday next; Judge W. N. Dusenberry and Hon. S. R. Thurman, of Provo, Mrs. E. B. Wells, Hon. F. S. Richards, Dr. J. M. Benedict, S. A. Kenner, Esq., Mrs. Dr. R. B. Pratt, and Mayor James Sharp, of Salt Lake.

The meeting was presided over by Mayor D. H. Peery, of Ogden. Three hours and a half were consumed in the proceedings, which nevertheless did not flag, and the speeches were heartily and at times enthusiastically applaud-

At the close, Hon. Joseph Stanford moved that the meeting re-adopt the principles set out in the platform of the People's Party, and ratify the nomination of Hon. John T. Caine as the People's candidate for Delegate to the Forty-ninth Congress.

The motion was carried unanimously and the meeting adjourned. The Ogden band was in attendance.

The party from this city were met at the depot in Ogden by Mayor Peery, Judge Shurtliff and other prominent citizens of our sister municipality, and royally entertained at the Broom Hotel, before and after the meeting-

The speakers occupied the platform in front of the pulpit. There were present on the stand, besides the Salt Lake party, which included Recorder H. M. 
