THE NEGRO EXCITEMENT.

It is claimed that they have a Black Messiah.

KANSAS CITY, Dec. 22.—The negroes of this city, and in fact the entire country, have become imbued with the same craze that has driven the Indians on the war-path. Their Messiah, in the shape of a black man, has come every night. He is holding meetings in the negro quarters of the city, which are crowded with the young and old of both sexes. These meetings are the scenes of the wildest, religious orgies and fanaticism. There is not only one dance held each night, but a dozen of them. Only last Wednesday no less than fifteen negroes applied to the chief of police for a license to hold one of these religious meetings to be followed by a dance. Of course the black Messiah cannot be present in person at all these dances, but he is by proxy in the person of some one of his many disciples, of whom the scores of negroes have been appointed by him.

Who is the Messiah, this black savior of his race? Few white men have seen him, as he is charged with associating with the dominant race. He keeps himself in seclusion and it is rarely that a white man can get to see him or talk with him. He is a coal-black negro, almost a giant in size and a native African, having been born in Liberia. He is now about 45 years old and has been in this country a little more than half of his life. He came to this city from Joplin, a negro settlement about twelve miles above the city on the Kaw river. There he was first heard of about a year ago. He came to this village from Maudan, Dak. His name is Reuben Carter. Last Friday Carter and a few of his followers were arrested, charged with a disturbance of the peace and, fearful of the police, fled to the city. Carter is a ready and fluent talker, uses good language, and has all the impassioned and fervent eloquence of his race. His followers are a mixture of negroes and some whites, and he is accounted for on no other hypothesis than of hypnotism.

The Trial of the New Cruiser "Newark"

DELAWARE BREAKWATER, Dec. 22.—The cruiser Newark this evening returned from her trip, having successfully maintained her power and speed for four hours. Unofficially it is understood that the Newark excels all other ships, which will give the Newark \$15,000 premium. She averaged in speed 19 knots an hour. Shortly after starting it was discovered that the ship was running overboard, causing a drag and consequent loss of the speed of the ship. This lasted only a few minutes, but it was decided to run half an hour longer so as to give the ship a fair trial. The day was perfect, with a breeze blowing sufficiently strong to produce "white caps." For the purpose of accurately determining her horsepower, the main engine's trial of four hours was divided into sixteen parts, of fifteen minutes each.

During the whole run there was not a mishap, the engines averaging about 127 revolutions per minute, and notwithstanding the extraordinary heat generated in the furnace, the maximum temperature of the engine rooms was but 164 degrees. The afternoon was devoted to testing the quickness with which the ship could be stopped and backed while traveling at full speed, and also to show her steering and turning capabilities. A complete turn was made in four minutes and five seconds. One outside and thirty-five seconds covered the time from going ahead at full speed to going astern at full speed. The latter movement, ordinarily a great strain upon the engines, was accomplished without starting a rivet.
