It is just the same story with all other branches of men's wearing ap-parel. The writer sums the whole bus-iness very tersely: "The result seems to be always the same. Just enough pay for slavish toil to KEEP BODY AND SOUL TOGETHER in one frail tenement." These women are to be the mo hers of future American citizens.
