Five ballots for United States senator and no choice. Much was the record of the Utah Legislature today. The strength of the various candidates remains practically the same as yesterday except as to King, the leading Democratic candidate, who received a brief and enthusiastic speech by the assembly, the additional vote came from Hon. Martin Hughes Cannon, who was absent from the Senate when the vote was taken yesterday.

In a brief and enthusiastic speech he announced the candidature of his choice. The followers of Hon. A. W. McKinnis remained solidly together, his eleven votes, the same number as yesterday. The Republican candidates received fourteen votes, one more than yesterday, owing to the arrival of Miller, who has been absent since Thursday last. There were three members absent today, two Democrats, Lloyd and Tamm, and one Republican, Mr. Lloyd is expected to arrive this evening and be in attendance tomorrow. Tamm is confined to his hotel with an attack of the grip. It is said the supporters of the various candidates will not stand together very long for the men of their choice as there is a manifest disposition to finish the work of electing a senator before the close of the week at latest and settle down to the regular routine of the session.
