The Memage on Civil Service Retorm.

CHICAGO, 18. - The Tribune's, Washington special says: The President's message on the civil service, which will be ready to send to Congress soon after the holidays, will show that the Presi-dent does not intend to surrender any position which he has assumed in his controversy with the Senate. It will set forth the President's It will set forth the President's views with respect to patronage, and will call attention to the fact that by the action of the republican national convention, and by nearly every State convention, Congress, as well as the President, has been instructed to enforce the civil service policy, and that he (the President) is simply endeavoring to carry out to the letter the instructions given him in advance by those who elected him. In this message the President will take very strong grounds as to the constitutional right of the Executive to originate all nominations. The message will set forth in a clearer light than before what
