SAVAGE ASSAULT BY JAPANESE

They Pounce on Three Firemen In Vancouver, Stabbing Them Many Times.

ONE OF THEM CANNOT LIVE

Cause of Trouble Was One of Men Accidentally Fell and Broke Window in Jap Store.

Portland, Or., Jan. 1 .- A special to the Oregonian from Vancouver, B. C., BAVS

Allan Anderson, a fireman, is dying and two other young men, also ment bers of the city fire department, are badly wounded and in the hospital as the result of a fight today in the Japquarter, with an overwhelming number of the subjects of the mikado. The fight was the worst in the city

The fight was the worst in the city since the September riots. Anderson, accompanied by J. Frost and T. McDonald, were passing a Jap-anese store, when Frost stumbled and fell hard against the plate glass win-dow front. The glass was smashed and the fragments were still rolling on the sidewalk when a score of Jap-anese appeared from the inside and rushed at the trio of whites. The fire-men were in uniform, with brass but-tons and official caps, but the Japanese knifed them furiously. Within three minutes there were docens of Japanese in the fight, all trying to get at the minutes there were dozens of Japanese in the fight, all trying to get at the white men. The latter were borne to the ground and cut and slashed until the sidewalk and front of the store were covered with blood. The police station is less than three blocks away, but it was a quarter of an hour before armed officers arrived it the scene of the fight Only four ar-

His two companions thought Ander-His two companions thought Ander-son dead, and had been fighting over his prostrate body when the police came. Anderson's face was marked with many slashes, up and down, and from one side to the other. From the back of his ear to his shouder was a slit two inches deep, that only missed the jugular vein by a fraction of an inch. His body was also stabbed in half a dozen places. Case of Rev. Dr. Hanna Raising Any Amount of Controversy.

Rome, Jan. 1 .- Accusations of modernism against and arguments in defense of Rev. Dr. Edward J. Hanna of Rochester over his candidature for the position of coadjutor archbishop of San Francisco, are increasing as the day draws near for the meeting of the congregation of the propaganda, in whose hands lies the power of appoint-

nent Cardinal Gotti, prefect of the con-gregation of the propaganda, has re-ceived from Dr. Hanna a long letter explaining his writings which caused the accusations of modernism to be made against him, and also stating the orthodoxy of his anthona

made against him, and also stating the orthodoxy of his opinions. Archbishop Riordan of San Francisco also has sent to the cardinals compos-ing the cognregation of the propoganda copies of the New York Review pub-lished by I. F. Brady and containing articles by Dr. Hanna, entitled "The Human Knowledge of Christ," which, were brought forward as being tainted with modernism and emphasizing the fact that the Jesuit priest Tyrell, also contributed to the same Review. De-fenders of Dr. Hanna say the alleged incriminating passages are only the ex-position of thoughts of other writers, Dr. Hanna believing that the time had not yet come for the construction of a perfect theological treatise on the hu-man knowledge of Christ,

MINERS CALLED OUT.

MINERS CALLED OUT. Madisonville, Ky., Jan. 1.—President Smith of the Mine Workers' union stated tonight that in response to the strike call sent out yesterday, 1.000 men in Houkins, Webster, Union and Chris-tian counties went out and this num-ber would be increased tomorrow. The mines in this city are still run-ning, but in the south portion of the county 300 men are out. In Webster county practically all the big mines are affected and the number of men out there is estimated at 700. In Union and Christian counties a large number responded and President Smith said tonight that 1,500 men would be out by Saturday.
