Strong Protests Against Liquor Selling in Ogden Canyon Resorts.

In District Court-Damage Suits Compromised-City Council Session -Wedding Permits.

The board of county commissioners had two matters of considerable importance before them for consideration at their regular meeting. The morning ression was accupied in listening to petitions and arguments on the granting of licenses for the sale of intoxicating liquors at the pleasure resorts in Ogden canyon. Several more petitions were presented by Attorney Jos-eph Chez and Judge Boreman asking that the commissioners grant no license to any person to sell liquors in the canyon, and spoke at length on the dangers that ensue from the liquor trafic at the pleasure resorts in the canyon

Bishop David McKay, representing the residents of Ogden valley appeared before the board and spoke against the letting of licenses to any one to dis-pense intoxicants in the canyon.

Judge Maginnis, presented an appli-cation from Potter Brothers, proprietors of the Oaks resort in the canyon for a liquor license. This is the first appli-cation this season. The matter was taken under advisement until Thurs-

At the afternoon session a number of At the afternoon session a number of the trustees of the county school dis-tricts were present and discussed and presented petitions for and against the consolidation of the school districts in the county into groups. Superintendent Wilson was present and asked for the Wilson was present and asked for the privilege of withdrawing his applica-tion for the consolidation of certain of the school districts in the eastern, northern and southeastern parts of the county, giving as his reason that the residents of those parts of the county are content with the present condi-tion of their school districts, but he urged that the districts in the western part of the county be consolidated into part of the county be consolidated into three districts.
