Principal New York Trades Unions Going Into Politics.

LEGAL DECISION THE CAUSE

Law That Had Cost Them Many Thousands to Enact Declared to be Unconstitutional.

New York, April 14.—For the first time since they were organized the principal trades unions in this city today decided to go into politics and start an independent labor party.

The meeting was called on account of the recent decisions of the court of appeals, declaring the prevailing rate of wages law and the state stone-dressing law unconstitutional.

In a Sermon Preached at Dedication of St. Patrick's Church, Toledo.

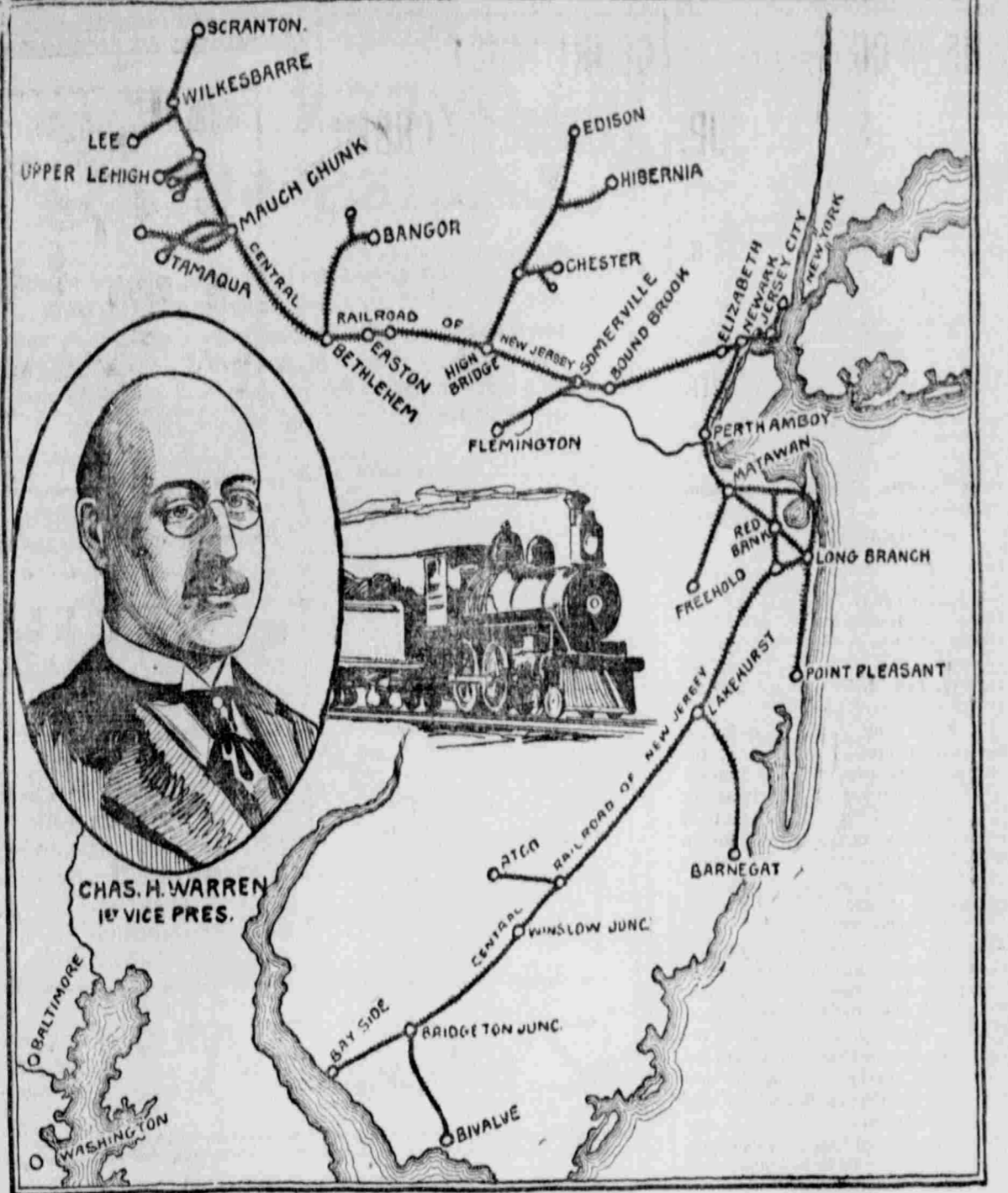

JAPAN'S WAR PREPARATIONS.

Indicate She Expects a Conflict With Russia.

SHE MOBILIZES HER FLEET.

Return of Chinese Emperor to Peking Earnestly Desired—Li Hung Must Give an Immediate Answer.

Pekin, April 15.—The preparations which the Japanese here are making for an early start indicate that they expect war between Russia and Japan.

Koumura Youtarara, the Japanese minister, accompanied by Gen. Yamaguchi, the Japanese commander, recently called upon Prince Ching and notified him that the return of Emperor Kwang Su to Peking was urgently desired.

It was pointed out to the Chinese plenipotentiary that the emperor's return was of the highest importance as affecting the maintenance of the integrity of the Chinese empire, and that he should be allowed space in carrying material which she annexed in vast quantities and applied to the local needs of the Manchurian line must be worth something.

Japan Will Appeal to Civilization to Exterminate Them.

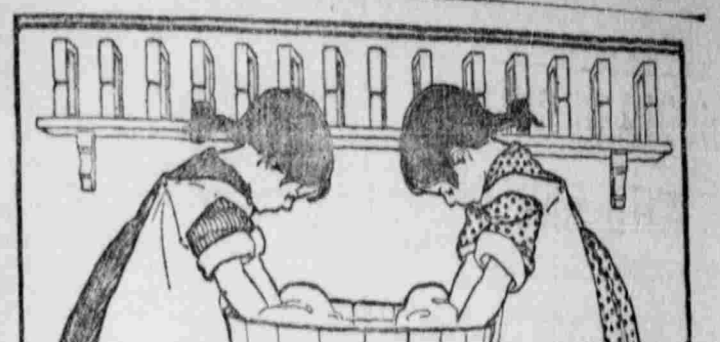
