

JAPAN'S WAR PREPARATIONS. Indicate She Expects a Conflict With Russia. SHE MOBILIZES HER FLEET. Return of Chinese Emperor to Pekin Earnestly Desired -Li Hung Must Give an Immediate Answer. Pekin, April 15 .- The preparations which the Japanese here are making for an early start indicate that they expect war between Russia and Japan. Vessels arriving at Taku from Nagasaki report the mobolization of the Japanese fleet and the continuance of preparations on board ship for the anticipated struggle, Koumara Youtarara, the Japanese minister, accompanied by Gen. Yamaguchi, the Japanese commander, recently called upon Prince Ching and

notified him that the return of Emperor Kwang Su to Pekin was urgently desired. Prince Ching was informed that the emperor's wishes would be respected by the foreign representatives, and that every courtesy would be shown him. It was pointed out to the Chinese plenipotentiary that the emperor's return was of the higheset importance as

affecting the maintenance of the integrity of the Chinese empire, and that he should come accompanied by every available soldier, by at least 20,000 men, if possible. These troops, it is further contended by the Japanese minister, must be sent into Manchuria, as the Russians reported great disturbances there, and it was not right that the task of quelling the trouble should be thrown upon the shoulders of one nation.

Finally Prince Ching was assured that if the 20,000 Chinese troops could not suppress the disorders in Manchuria, other powers would send an international force to co-operate with China, which all the powers regarded as a friendly power. No reply having been received to this communication, Li Hung Chang was today notified to the same effect, and told that Emperor Kwang Su must give an immediate answer.

Big Fire in Boston.

Boston, April 14 .- The main building of the extensive blower works of the B. F. Sturtevant company, in the Ja-malca Plain district, was burned early this morning, causing losses of \$250,000, The concern manufactured various kinds of machinery and electrical goods. as well as blowers. All patterns and plans were destroyed.

The company has recently added \$75,-660 worth of tools and machinery, and had a large amount of electrical work ready for the government for use on battleships and cruisers, in course of construction, all of which were destroyed.

After Kim Yang Chun was beheaded, that clique gathered in such force that Min Kongsik and his chief supporters were imprisoned, Min being ordered
