

EX-GOV. ODELL ON N. Y. CAMPAIGN

Says Management of the Republican Side Was "Most Asinine."

LEAVES PARTY IN BAD SHAPE.

Thinks That the Interference of President Roosevelt Did More Harm Than Good.

New York, Nov. 13.—B. B. Odell, of Newburgh, former governor and ex-chairman of the state Republican committee, said today that the management of the Republican state campaign was "the most asinine" that he ever knew. The whole state ticket, he said, might just as well have been elected. As the result stands it looks like a democratic victory and leaves the Republican party in bad shape with a national campaign coming on. The Republicans, he declared, made no campaign at all, but put it all on Mr. Hughes' shoulders.

"I heard absolutely nothing about any state campaign up my way," said Mr. Odell. "We didn't know there was a headquarters down here. I wasn't informed of anything that was going on."

"My advice was never asked once. Many of my friends over the state have the same experience."

"Even when Mr. Hughes was touring my county I was not notified or consulted. I wasn't informed of the smallest detail."

Continuing, Mr. Odell said: "The people of this state have always resented the interference of a president of the United States in their local elections. They have done so since the days of Dewitt Clinton. I think that the interference of President Roosevelt did more harm than good."

"I do not wish to appear in the role of general critic of the conduct of the campaign, but so far as I can make out there was no real campaign. No use was made of the record of the Republican party. It was all a case of personalities between the candidates for governor."

Mr. Odell said that Mr. Hearst was greatly strengthened as a political factor by this campaign and that while he might not be elected president, he was now a man to be reckoned with in the future. He said that a combination of Bryan and Hearst would be a hard one for the Republicans to beat.

"I believe," said Mr. Odell, "that with intelligent management the entire Republican state ticket could have been elected. I am not knocking, but I am very much concerned for the future of the Republican party."

"I believe that by the exercise of mutual forbearance and consideration the Republican party might be able to shape to make a successful campaign in 1908."

PERU PROHIBITS EXPORT OF SILVER.

Lima, Peru, Nov. 13.—Although there exists no law to the contrary, the government today refused to allow a local firm of bankers to ship 12,000 silver bars (about 2,000 pounds), to London. Furthermore, the authorities are searching the baggage of passengers leaving the country, and all silver coin in excess of ten soles is being seized.

The price of silver in Peru is rising, and the ministry of finance has been in conference with local bankers, financiers, merchants and members of congress to discuss action in the premises. The advisability of an export duty on silver coin has been seriously discussed.

TWO YEARS IN JAIL.

Shreveport, La., Nov. 13.—After being in jail over two years, charged with the murder of Jesse Brown at Girard, La., W. D. Womack and Ryan Henderson, white men, were acquitted at Monroe this morning.

A FIGHT IN CHEYENNE.

Artillerymen from Ft. Russell Attack A Number of Infantrymen.

Cheyenne, Wyo., Nov. 13.—Quite a sanguinary battle occurred on the streets of Cheyenne tonight, when a detachment of artillerymen from Fort Russell attacked a number of infantrymen, all on horseback. Each side fought desperately with knives. Five men were cut and slashed, one of whom is expected to die. The women were taken to the hospital.

The cause of the fight is an old feud existing between the two arms of the service.

NEGRO BANK BROKE.

Greenville, S. C., Nov. 13.—The Workington Savings & Loan company of this city, the only negro banking institution in the state, closed its doors today by order of the state bank examiner, Charles H. Hester, who said it was the cause of the bank's embarrassment. The capital stock was \$14,000.

GARSDIE ARRAIGNED.

Bond Placed at \$10,000; Will Plead Nov. 16.

Butte, Mont., Nov. 13.—F. E. Garsdie, cashier of the defunct Astor bank, was arraigned today before Justice Dwyer, charged with the embezzlement of \$10,000 of that institution. He will plead Nov. 16. Bond was fixed at \$10,000 and has not been furnished. Garsdie fled to Minneapolis, Minn., after the failure of the bank, but was extradited and brought to Butte last week.

POISONED BY MILK.

Long Beach, Cal., Nov. 13.—Two small children of Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Redburn of this city are dead and a third is in danger of death from what is believed to have been the result of drinking the milk of a deformed cow. The animal was injured by an electric car about a year ago, but it was thought her milk was still fit for use by the family.

WORK OF A DESPERADO.

Bad Negro Kills Two Patrolmen, One Negro, Fatally Wounding Another.

Asheville, N. C., Nov. 13.—Fighting bravely in defense of their police captain, Patrolmen Charles Shickler and William Bailey of this city were shot to death on South Main street at 11:30 o'clock tonight by a negro, who also killed one negro and fatally wounded another. The murderer gave his name as Will Harris of Charlotte, N. C., a desperado for whom a large reward has been standing for some time prior to the death of the two officers. A negro restaurant keeper named Ben Allison was shot and killed by Harris without provocation. Another negro named Tom Neil was fatally wounded, he too being shot before the officers took a hand in the melee.

Harris started on his tour from a negro house on Valley street. He fired into two houses as he made his way to South Main street. At Eagle street he fired and wounded Allison. On South Main street, the desperado encountered Tom Neil and shot at him. Police Captain Page and Officers Bailey and Shickler rushed from police headquarters in pursuit. Capt. Page, who was near the center of the main street, received a bullet in the arm from the negro's rifle. Page called upon Shickler to fire, but before that officer could do so, Shickler fell dead with a bullet in the chest. Bailey fired twice without hitting and the negro then shot and killed Bailey. The negro escaped.

A general alarm was turned in by the chief of police to call out the militia companies, and several armed posses quickly formed to pursue the murderer. At 2:30 this morning the Southern railway dispatched a special train to Tryon, 40 miles away, to secure bloodhounds to aid in running down the negro, who at last report had taken refuge in the Hillmore estate.

PROTESTS AGAINST DISCHARGE OF NEGRO TROOPS

Washington, Nov. 13.—The war department mails are heavy with letters protesting against the discharge without honor of the three companies of the Twenty-fifth infantry, colored. Most of these originate in Massachusetts, but nearly every section of the country is represented. They can be of no avail now, it is said, because the action was taken by direct order of the president, who alone can relieve the severity of the order. Most of the communications, according to the department, reveal ignorance of important facts connected with the case. Acting Secy. Oliver has ordered the printing in pamphlet form of the report of Col. Bixby, who made the original investigation into the rioting at Massachusetts last August by some of the members of the Twenty-fifth infantry, as well as the further report of Inspector General Garlington, and these pamphlets will be supplied to the correspondents.

EXPLORING HERCULEANEUM.

Ambassador White is Sure Many Art Treasures Will be Found.

New York, Nov. 14.—Henry White, United States ambassador to Italy, arrived on the Kaiser Wilhelm II yesterday on a short visit to his family after an absence of several years.

In an interview Ambassador White said the relations between Italy and the United States were of the most friendly nature.

"I have read the article concerning the proposed excavation of Herculeaneum with great interest," he said. "I hope it is true that the kings of Italy, England and Germany have promised their support to Prof. Wulffstein in this great undertaking. I am sure that the excavations would result in the discovery of numberless treasures of great artistic value."

Mr. White said he had no business to transact in the United States except to see the president, and spend a few days with relatives.

CELEBRATE FULTON'S BIRTHDAY

New York, Nov. 14.—The members and guests of the Robert Fulton memorial association will meet at the Waldorf Astoria today to celebrate the birthday of the inventor of the steamboat. Cornelius Vanderbilt, the president of the association, will preside and many persons connected with the army, navy and merchant marine will be present. A ship for the monument to Robert Fulton may be chosen.

Suggested That All Idle Negroes In the South be Sent to The Isthmus.

HELP SOLVE RACE PROBLEM.

To be Convicted and Sentence Suspended if They Will Go and Never Return.

Nashville, Tenn., Nov. 13.—The Southern Quarantine and Immigration convention, which at noon today assumed its new title of Southern Immigration and Industrial association, concluded its business tonight.

The sentiment of the delegates is largely in favor of welcoming any desirable class of white immigrants without regard to nationality, yet there appears at times some desire to keep the black man, with all his faults, where he is.

At the afternoon session N. F. Thompson of Chattanooga advocated the strictest enforcement of the vagrancy laws, with a suspension of sentence in the case the negro would go to the Panama canal, and in following into the race problem said:

"I would have the world know that this race problem has its most fertile source of perpetuity in the effort of politicians who and a more efficient body on which to ride into place and power. When there are no elections in the south we hear very little about this race matter."

ATTEMPT TO BRIBE JURY.

Friday, Oct. 13.—Charges of alleged attempts at bribery of a member or members of the petit jury which tender during the prosecution of the Standard Oil case, are being pressed at an adjourned session of the grand jury which was convened today.

It is alleged that a party who sat in the trial of the case, in which a verdict was rendered finding the Standard oil company guilty of alleged violation of the anti-trust law, were interrogated by the grand jury this afternoon. While the utmost secrecy is maintained, Prosecutor David, who conducted the prosecution of the Standard oil case, is directing the grand jury investigation, and stated this afternoon that all rumors in connection with the alleged attempted bribery would be gone into thoroughly. It is expected that the grand jury will make its report tomorrow afternoon.

HUNTER SHOTS LITTLE GIRL.

Columbus, Ind., Nov. 12.—Myrtle, the 7-year-old daughter of William Neal, who resides near this city, was shot and instantly killed late this afternoon near her home by an unknown hunter. The little one had gone to the rural free delivery box which is a quarter of a mile from the residence, to see if there was any mail, and was shot in the left temple.

BRICK WALL FALLS.

San Francisco, Nov. 13.—Without a moment's warning a brick wall at Market and Twelfth streets fell over at 2 o'clock this afternoon, burying two workmen in the debris. The injured: John C. Anderson, 40 years old, and Andrew Angelico, 30 years old.

At the time of the accident about 30 men were at work excavating a basement on the slope of the wall. When the bricks started to fall the men started to run, but Capas and Angelico were caught under the edge of the tumbling mass.

A team of horses was driven from beneath the wall just before it fell. A moment later and the horses and driver would have been crushed to death.

The wall fell on account of the fact that considerable earth had been removed from beneath the base, which has been weakened by the fire.

It was only this morning that the men had been told that they were working dangerously near the wall, but they believed it to be safe and worked on without a thought of the danger that towered over their heads.

At a late hour this afternoon the rescuers had removed most of the fallen brick. They did not come across any more injured workmen and as nearly all the men who were engaged in the excavation have been accounted for it is believed that but two persons were seriously injured.

ITALIAN KILLS ITALIAN.

Slayer Claims His Victim Had Threatened to Kill Him.

New York, Nov. 13.—In the presence of scores of men and women hurrying through Mott street, in the Italian quarter, Enrico Davone today shot and killed Nunzio Legato, a fellow countryman. The killing was justified, as Legato, who had represented himself as an agent of the Black Hand society and demanded \$500, would have killed him had he not fired first.

Davone was about to hand over to Legato a portion of this amount when the shooting occurred.

A loaded revolver was found on Legato's body.

Favone later told a coroner he shot Legato because the latter had threatened to kill him unless he went to Ellis Island and swore that a woman who is detained there is his wife. He said he knew Legato wanted to get the woman into the country for immoral purposes. Favone was held without bail.
