Police Cap-tain Page and Officers Bailey and Blackstock rushed from police head-quarters in pursuit. Capt. Page, who met the negro in the center of Main street, received a bullet in the arm from the negro's rife. Page called upon Panama

the negro's rifle. Page called upon Blackstock to fire, but before that offi-cer could do so, Blackstock fell dead with a bullet in the chest. Bailey fired twice without hitting and the negro then shot and killed Bailey. The negro

A general alarm was turned in by the chief of police to call out the militia companies, and several armed <u>posses</u> quickly formed to pursue the murderer.

At 2:30 this morning the Southern railway dispatched a special train to Tryon, 40 miles away, to secure blood-hounds to aid in running down the negro, who at last report had taken refuge in the Biltmore estate.
