BRIGHT PEACE PROSPECTS.

Insurance Men Have a Plan of Duty-Bale Cutting to Be No Longer Favored.

There are signs of peace on the insurance horizon, says Saltair's Dan Francisco Cramm. The threatened extension of liabilities to the entire region formerly occupied by the Pacific Insurance Union has been prevented by the formation of the Utah, Montana and Northwest unions, and with the possible intervention of the Western Union in Colorado, the war is now gradually circumscribed to California. This has encouraged several insurance managers to look about for a modus vivendi in this state, and the prospects are fair that an understanding will be reached. The movement for the laying of the hatchet will come through the board of fire underwriters, who will make arrangements with all the insurance companies in the state to effect an understanding. This done, a committee will be appointed to form a new association to supersede and replace the present one, and the new organization will be in form similar to that existing throughout the state, which will report to the main body, and thus harmony be restored. The Latter-day Saint College.

The Latter-day Saint College, in this city, will open its doors to students on Monday, September 2, 1895. The following courses are offered: Preparatory, three years; matriculation, four years (two years preparatory, commercial, two years literary). Five years (three years preparatory, commercial, two years literary). Five years (three years preparatory, special courses for students wanting to give their attention to specific fields of work. Students who have completed the necessary grade work will be admitted to the first year of the preparatory course, without examination; those who have completed the eighth grade are eligible to entrance upon the second year.
