The vessel was plundered and destroyed by the Achenese. The crew consisted of Moors, two Italians, two Germans, two Norwegians and one American. The British gunboat Pegasus sent to their relief in December, was unable to communicate with the Rajah and British Consul Kennedy reported that if the Pegasus had fired noon the tribe, the prisoners would have been massacred.
