TAFT DISCUSSES BRYAN'S PROGRAM

Compares President's Corporation Plan With Proposition to "Destroy Every Corporation."

TARIFF REVISION IS CERTAIN

In Majority of Cases Will Result In Reductions, Some Schedules to be Raised.

Denied the Assertion That the Republican Party Would Not Give An Honest Revision.

Newark, N. J., Oct. 19.—William H. Taft arrived here early today on the first stage of a campaign which will embrace three states. A big crowd gave Mr. Taft an enthusiastic greeting on arrival. The reception committee which met Mr. Taft at the train was headed by former Gov. Franklin Murphy.

REPUBLICAN RECORD.

The theater was filled and many were unable to gain admittance and were whiled away. Mr. Taft began his address with a brief review of the record of the Republican party, saying that he referred to these accomplishments, including the Panama canal, the Philippines, Cuba, Porto Rico and the Panama canal, and the control of corporations, to show that the Republican party is the party of progress.

TARIFF REVISION.

Turning to the tariff, Mr. Taft said revision was certain. He said that the measure of protection might be equal, some schedules would doubtless be raised. He said that the Republican party would not give an honest revision.

BRYAN'S POLITICAL RECORD.

Judge Taft reviewed Mr. Bryan's political record and declared that every theory the Nebraska had advocated for today covers New Jersey and California. This was illustrated, he said, by the Oklahoma constitution, which is a perfect zoological garden of Bryanese provisions.

DISCUSSES CAMPAIGN.

Washington, Oct. 19.—Before leaving Washington early today Judge Taft discussed the future demands of the campaign which he is expected to complete. He said that the program mapped out for him will be extensive he hoped to be able to complete the work by conserving his voice as well as his strength.

THE PARTY.

ESPEE TO SPEND MORE FORTUNES

Million Goes for Pre-Cooling Plants to Treat Perishable Freight.

NEW SYSTEM FOUND GOOD

Sudden Chilling of Vegetable Matter Causing Suspension of Processes of Decay.

San Francisco, Oct. 19.—The Southern Pacific Railroad company has announced its determination to expend a million dollars in the near future in the construction of plants for pre-cooling fruit and vegetables, according to the Roy Sprague system, the object being to permit of long hauls of perishable freight with little risk of decay. Two large plants, one at Roseville and one at Colton, will be erected, the first capable of chilling 20 carloads in four hours and the latter having a capacity of 40 carloads in the same time.

KILLED IN KANSAS CITY TROLLEY CAR COLLISION

Kansas City, Oct. 19.—Three trolley cars on the Troost avenue line collided in their effort to escape from a jam here this morning and were badly wrecked. One man was killed and 12 other passengers were more or less seriously injured. The airbrakes on one of the cars failed to work when it reached Troost and the car crashed back over a steep hill. There were two coming up the hill following the car and for three blocks these cars backed away in a thrilling attempt to escape. The cars were crowded with passengers bound downtown many of them prominent business men. Finally the cars collided with terrific force and all three were splintered. A good many passengers were still on board and the more seriously hurt were among these.

FINAL STRUGGLE FOR EMPIRE STATE

Chairman Mack is Massing All the Forces of Militant Democracy For the Great Effort.

SURE OF BRYAN'S ELECTON.

Convinced There Will be a Landslide—Bases Opinion on Careful Poll in Doubtful States.

New York, Oct. 19.—Massing all the forces of the militant Democracy in the final struggle of the campaign to capture the Empire state, Norman E. Mack chairman of the Democratic national committee, bearing prophecies of victory, came from the west today to take personal charge of what he declares will be the hardest fought finish of any presidential campaign in this state. Not only Mr. Bryan, but other Democratic speakers of note, including United States senators, will swing through the state in an effort to capture New York's electoral vote for the Democratic ticket. Mr. Mack held several conferences today with eastern leaders looking to the devisement of plans for final arrangements. I am firmly convinced the W. J. Bryan will be elected by a landslide," said Mr. Mack. "Within the last two weeks I have caused a careful poll to be made by captains in hundreds of precincts in New York, Indiana and Ohio for the purpose of obtaining the percentage of Republican loss over four years ago. The results of that poll were amazing. In no instance have the reports made me shown the percentage of Republican loss in this state to be less than 25 per cent, and in Erie county the losses to the Republicans ran as high as 40 per cent. Equally large losses to the Republicans were shown, not only in Ohio and Indiana, but in the 12 other states which the two parties are contesting. These figures mean only one thing—Bryan's election by a tremendous plurality. That those figures are correct and based on a careful poll is shown by the fact that I directed the precinct captains to submit with their reports the names of Republicans with their addresses, who intended to vote for Mr. Bryan.

SOMETHING NEW IN AERONAUTICS

C. W. Williams Has a Machine That Will Prove a Revelation in Stability.

IMPOSSIBLE TO TURN TURTLE

Called the Monoplane—It Folds Back And Much Less Cumbersome Than Fixed Planes.

New York, Oct. 19.—Aeronautic inventors and investigators believe that in his monoplane now at the Morris park testing grounds of the Aeronautic society of New York, for a practical test, C. W. Williams, of Richmond Hill, has a machine which will prove a revelation in stability, if not in speed. The greatest point in favor of the Williams machine is its stability. It has the appearance of a monstrous parachute, and Williams asserts that in case of accident in mid air, it would act as one, and settle gently to the ground without damage to airship or navigator. This action would be due, first, to the unusually large sustaining surface and the air spaces between the wings, which would compose it, and second, to the low point at which the weight of machinery and operator is suspended. Williams says that if the machine is not in use, making it to turn over, and if this proves by actual experiment to be a fact, one of the greatest dangers of aerial navigation will have been overcome.
