

THE TABERNACLE CHOIR.

Its Pilgrimage to the World's Fair and Its Victory.

The Deseret Journal Begins the Year Ago Today—How the Choir Fared.

An ardent admirer of the Salt Lake Tabernacle choir writes to the News as follows, under date of today, on an event that every citizen looks back upon and remembers with feelings of pride and satisfaction:

On Tuesday afternoon, one year ago today, Aug. 28, our Tabernacle choir left Salt Lake City on their triumphant and highly successful journey to enter a competition against any body of singers in the world who were to enter the arena, and their choir composition was in the West, who had for at least twenty years established themselves at London as champions everywhere in church work.

It seems like a dream, yet it is real when we think of the contest at the depot one year ago this afternoon, thousands of enthusiastic friends of every creed, crowding the length of the train with one happy wish to their hearts' content to see the "Mormon" choir go. It was a grand scene, and the choir, with their banners, were escorted to the depot by a large number of friends.

Well, away they sped with cheer, "Good bye, 'Good bye you," singing in their song. Their entrance into Wyoming was welcomed with music, flowers, fruits and cheer from the good people of Evanston and Rock Springs. However, while making a public demonstration, on their arrival greeted them at the depot in such numbers that hundreds could not gain admittance into the elegant church. Full of humility and prayer to their hearts for success they took their places before an audience friendly, but with evident curiosity on many a countenance, when the Ref. "Hallelujah" commenced, placing evident, deep satisfaction in every note which the illustrious organ even could not express more eloquently that the victory was won.

Withstanding ill-wishers and such as a constant change of seating arrangement to various halls some of which were very preparing, disarranging the order of seating, placing the choir on level floor, etc., which would make it almost impossible to see or hear as to the harmonious work. Yet Kansas City and St. Louis only added to the success begun at Denver. On arriving at Chicago they found some of their eastern competitors there already, but with kindly greetings. On hearing our choir of their song at an entertainment, some Salt Lake were at once sanguine of our choir's success. But the chance in Chicago was almost entirely lost. Our boys were told in the order of appointing, and they did themselves proud. Mr. J. J. Cannon, the adjudicator from London, declaring "First west of the Atlantic Ocean." The two Welsh choirs from the other side, were indisputable in their excellence. None could be more confirmed than our boys in listening to them, they were beating with pride at what he knew must be his defeat.

"That is worth more to me than a prize. That is perfection. Remember it, boys, and let us work up to it." Friday was the day of the final contest, and the choir, with their banners, were escorted to the depot by a large number of friends.

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Friday of the coming week will be the anniversary of the day of contest and the winning of the \$1,000 prize, and striking the choir will consist of it at Salt Lake their own great triumph, with perhaps thousands of their friends present with them to enjoy the result.
