GREAT BATTLE EXPECTED.

Militiamen Called Out-Anticipating Many Casualties, Field Hospital Is Established.

San Hernardino, Cal. Oct. 9 .- A score of militiamen, armed with their high power government rifles, are burrying over the descrit today to join the posse or Sheriff Ralphs, which surrounded Willie Boy, the Plate Indian nurderer. entremched in a canyon near Bullion mountain. They are making all hasts to be in time for the battle certain to occur before the desperate outlaw is captured or killed. Their only fear is that the fight may be over before they arrive roulght.

Reinforcements also are on the way from Banning, whence they were dis-patched by Claim True, the Indian agent at that place, with supplies for

The operations for the capture of Willie Boy have assumed a warlike as-Wille Boy have assumed a warlike as-pect, and in making preparations for the desperate battle expected today Sheriff Raiphs has established a field hospital. The only patient so far is Charles Sitchie, the posseman who was seriously wounded in the hip in the first brush with the Indian Wednesday. Dr. W. H. Mills, who was rushed from Whitewater to Bullion mountain, in response to the telegraph appeal from Raiphs for a disctor to care for his wounded deputy, is in charge of the field hospital. He will remain with the posse until Willie Roy is captured, to render medical aid to any more of the mar medical aid to any more of the markunters who may be wounded by the Indian. by the Indian.

WILLIE BOY'S FIGHT.
