REPUBLICANS IN CONTROL.

New Administration Assumes the Government Of the Municipality.

Oil Men Meet—Jim Fitzgerald Arrested—Humane Society—Gates Concert—Board of Education.

OGDEN, UTAH, Jan. 6, 1902. Tonight the city officials who have controlled the city government for the past two years will step down and out of office and the newly elected officials will assume the responsibility of transacting the city's business.

The entire city government will be under Republican rule, during the next two years, as the newly elected officials are all Republicans. It is expected that some of the appointive offices will be changed tonight, as it is understood the state has already been made up.

OIL MEN MEET.
J. J. Olson was selected by the Ogden oil men and the Western Oil companies to go to Denver, there to represent them in the oil men's convention to be held in that city today and tomorrow. Mr. Olson's selection was made yesterday morning and he left on the afternoon train for Denver. The gentleman will bring before the convention the necessity of the Western oil companies having an exchange in Utah, and endeavor to have Ogden chosen as the place.

JIM FITZGERALD ARRESTED AND ESCAPES.
Jim Fitzgerald, a notorious character, was taken in Salt Lake City yesterday by Detective Pender and Officer Burton. He was taken to the police station by the officers and left there in the custody of an officer, the day jailer and Justice Hall, while officers Pender and Burton went out to communicate with the Salt Lake officers. The prisoner was not placed behind the bars, as the officers were not positive they had the right man and the officers at the police station in whose charge he was left were authorized to apply to the state board of land commissioners for the purchase of forty acres of shale land at the mouth of Provo canyon.

Recorder Buchi reported that all the official bonds of city officers and councilmen, elected November 5th, had been filed. The committee on sewer reported on the claim of the Brigham Young academy, for constructing sewer, recommending that the sum of \$108.75 be placed to the credit of the academy, to be applied on water rates charged against the academy.

Among the items in the receipts are: License, \$3,355.30; taxes, \$15,766.05; water rates, \$4,690.14. Some of the amounts distributed have been for the following purposes: Streets and alleys, \$7,513.65; fire department, \$1,739.13; police, \$2,071.65; electric lights, \$934.10; salaries, \$2,027.65; irrigation, \$1,246.25; waterworks, \$1,174.63; cemetery, \$1,238.50; redemption of bonds, \$5,002.80; interest on bonds, \$6,767. Reports of the auditor and treasurer for the quarter ending Jan. 1, 1902, were also presented together with the report of the committee on finance to the effect that the reports had been audited and found correct. AFFAIRS OF MUNICIPALITY.

Old Administration Preparing to Make Way for The New—Department Reports.

Hearings in District Court—Priesthood Meeting—G. A. R. Officers Elected.

Provo, Utah County, Jan. 6.—At the meeting of the city council held Saturday evening, Mayor Taylor and Recorder Buchi were authorized to apply to the state board of land commissioners for the purchase of forty acres of shale land at the mouth of Provo canyon.

Recorder Buchi reported that all the official bonds of city officers and councilmen, elected November 5th, had been filed. 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of city officials were also presented and accepted, and a number of claims allowed. The council adjourned till this morning at 11 o'clock, when any other unfinished business that may come up will be disposed of, and the affairs of the city turned over to the new administration at 12 o'clock noon.

DISTRICT COURT.
In the Fourth district court, Saturday, before Judge Morse, the evidence in the case of Provo City et al. vs. West Union Canal company was concluded and the case was taken under advisement till early in the week. The judge expressed a doubt, in the case of the intervenor, Newell, of his right to divert water, formerly taken through the Lake Bottom Canal company, at a point higher up the river, and also intimated that the Lake Bottom Canal company had not received sufficient water in the apportionment of the commission, for the reason that Mr. Newell's interest had not been considered in making the apportionment of water.

Estate of David D. Sablin, deceased; order of final distribution; David R. Taylor appointed commissioner in partition.

Estate of Amos D. Holdaway, deceased; decree granting title to Shadrach Holdaway for certain Provo real estate which decedent held in trust for Shadrach Holdaway. The decree was given in conformity with an agreement entered into between the administrator and Mr. Holdaway.
Evidence in the case of Ira W. Kennedy vs. Emma Kennedy et al. was concluded and the case taken under advisement.

WAS NOT "SMALLPOX."
The city physician has decided that the skin disease which has shown itself in several families of the camp is not "smallpox." These cases have been quarantined as chicken pox and are in a very mild form.

NEW CITY OFFICERS.
The new city officers will take the oath of office and enter upon their duties. Gus J. Hendrick, who has held the position of city marshal of Eureka for no less than ten years, will go out of office today to be succeeded by Colin McMurphy who was elected on the Democratic ticket at the last election. The new city administration is Democratic from top to bottom and inasmuch as they were elected upon a platform pledging them to secure a water system for the camp their work will be closely watched. The town is now without a water system and the only protection against fire lies in the use of the chemical apparatus with which the fire department is equipped. The water used for culinary purposes is taken from wells and in some parts of the camp it is impossible to get water by sinking, making it necessary to haul the article in barrels.

ACCIDENT AT AJAX.
C. J. Park, a miner at the Ajax mine near Mammoth, received injuries last Saturday evening which may deprive him of the use of his lower limbs. Parks was sitting on a timber using a drill when a portion of the ceiling of the stope caved upon him knocking him off his seat. He fell about ten feet and when picked up it was found that he had sustained some severe injuries in the back, and that the lower part of his body was paralyzed.
