### LOCAL BRIEFS.

A dance and reception will be given next Saturday evening, in the assembly hall at the University, in honor of the visiting Wyoming football team.

Robert B. Hildebrand, a salesman of this city filed a petition in bankruptcy yesterday afternoon, giving his assets \$100,000 and his liabilities at \$99,900. The principal creditors are George F. Osgood of Goldfield, William Clark of Bullock and Mrs. S. D. Bennett of Salt Lake.

The funeral of Jerry C. Sullivan who died from the effects of a missed shot at Salt Lake recently, was held yesterday afternoon, from St. Mary's Cathedral with full music from the cathedral choir. Dr. S. Thomas Kearns David Keith, Milt Fulton of Elsie, and miners from Park City and Eureka were present. The pall bearers were Joseph Russell, Dennis O. Lynch, John P. Shea, James P. Driscoll, J. O'Brien, J. A. Murphy, Eugene John C. Lynch, Salt Lake, and M. F. Simmon, foreman Daily-Judge mine, Park City. Interment was in Calvary cemetery.

The civil service commission announces an examination on Oct. 25, 1905, to secure eligibles from which to make certification to fill a vacancy in the position of teacher of agriculture, at \$1,000 per annum, in the Choctaw school, Oklahoma, and vacancies as they may occur in any branch of the service requiring similar qualifications. Age limit, 20 years or over on the date of the examination. The department states that it desires to secure this position a person who has technical training equivalent to that acquired by graduates from agricultural colleges.

According to the report of the street department, the poll-tax collections for the month of September amounted to \$5,615, of which \$492 was paid in cash and the rest in labor. In September last year the cash collections amounted to \$7,000, a little more than half the cash collections of this month. The total collections for the first nine months of the year amounted to \$1,325, while the collections for the entire year last year reached \$2,229.50. It is believed that the close of the present month will see those figures equalled as October considered a good month for collecting poll tax.

Internal Revenue Collector Callister reports the revenue collections of this district for the month of September to be \$43,627.59, an increase of \$7,030.63 over the same month last year, the receipts for that month being \$36,596.86. The increase is largely in beer stamps and special collections. Since July 1, the budgeting of the fiscal year, the total increase in the collections in this district, up to the end of the year, reached \$600,000. The states of Utah, Montana and Idaho comprise the revenue district under Mr. Callister's jurisdiction.

Fifty 150 boys and men were enrolled last night at the Y. M. C. A. as students. Secretary Cox presided and read a paper upon the purposes of the association, particularly its educational lines; and Prof. R. G. French educational and religious director of the association outlined the work to be carried on during the ensuing term. The ages of the new students range from 15 to 40, and it was announced that active work would begin this evening. Secy. Cox expressed himself as much pleased with the prospect, and expects 200 students in all. Sessions of the school will be held every night.

Mrs. G. H. Raybould has received word from Santa Rosa, Cal., of the death there of her sister, Mrs. M. B. Mac. Mrs. Mac had been ill for some time and on July 20 her mother, Mrs. Sarah A. Pool, left Salt Lake to remain with her daughter. She was the mother of the late Sam. The funeral will be held at Santa Rosa today. Mr. Mac, husband of the deceased, was an old Salt Laker, but has been in California for the past 22 years. He formerly ran the Mac House, near the present fire department headquarters, and also ran a restaurant near the corner of First South and West Temple. He married his wife here, and together they went to California to engage in the ranching business. Mrs. Mac leaves for San Francisco, Mrs. B. S. Gregory of Mexico City, and William E. Mac of Honolulu. She was born in Grantsville, but spent her childhood in Salt Lake.
