**SHOT DEAD.**—We received the following dispatch per Deseret Telegraph Line this afternoon, just as we were "making up":  
"Provo, 29th, 8.30, p.m."

"A man named Dick Brown, in the employ of Wm. D. Roberts, was shot dead about eight o'clock last night, near Roberts' residence. Further particulars are unknown, as the inquest is not yet over."

**CREDITABLE.**—Notwithstanding that this is the holiday season there has been little or no drunkenness in the City for over a week. We were informed, yesterday, by Alderman Clinton that only one person, charged with being intoxicated, had been brought before him from Wednesday, the 21st inst., till Tuesday 27th. This speaks well for the good order and sobriety which prevails in this community.

**A SAD ACCIDENT.**—From the Ogden Junction, of the 28th ult., we glean the following particulars of a mournful accident which occurred at South Weber on the Saturday previous:

"Two boys were out hunting, and while crossing the ice on the river, about half a mile from the school house, one of them slipped and fell. He had a shot gun in his left hand, and when he fell the muzzle pointed to his heart; the gun went off and at the same time, a can of powder in his left pocket exploded, and he was killed instantaneously. The other boy was struck in the leg by one or two shots, but was not injured."

The name of the unfortunate boy who was killed, was William Simpson Cook, son of David S. and Janet Cook. He was a promising lad, aged 18 years 5 months and 3 days, and was well respected in the settlement, all the people there attending his funeral, which took place on Monday. This calamity threw a cloud over the whole community, spoiling the joy and hilarity of the season.

**PRISONERS ESCAPED.**—McKay and Heath, two of the three men who committed the mail robbery in Juab County, a short time since, and who, it will be remembered, were promptly captured by the County Sheriff, and posse, together with three others who were under confinement at Camp Douglas and whose names we have not learned, escaped from that place last night. St. Ledger, the other of the three mail robbers and who turned States' evidence, did not run with the rest. He thought it would be more prudent to remain, being aware that the feelings of his ex-confederates, towards him, cannot be of the gentlest description.

**THE CUSHMAN TROUPE** had a very lively time last night before an appreciative audience. The object of the occasion was praiseworthy, the principal part of the proceeds being tendered for the use of the Ward Sabbath School. The singing and recitations were varied, chaste, very amusing and instructive, and executed in good style. Mr. Burke's performance in the musical department was most artistic. They give another grand entertainment this evening at the Assembly Rooms and should be well patronized.

**SUPPOSED INCENDIARISM.**—A fire, at Virginia City, Nev., on Christmas night last, according to one of our exchanges, broke out in a shed in the rear of the Inevitable Hose Company's hall, and before the fire engines could be got out, spread to a saloon on the south and a furniture establishment on the north, both of which places, if not the greater portion of that part of the town, seemed doomed. But the Fire Department was prompt and the manner in which they turned loose upon the flames with their streams was creditable and praiseworthy. The loss to the furniture establishment, building and stock, was \$300; to the saloon, on thought it would be \$1,000, and the damage to the house here is estimated at \$800. The same paper says there can be no doubt but it was the work of an incendiary.

**LIVERPOOL.**—A letter from Elder John Jaques, now in the Liverpool office, written on the 28th inst., received this morning, contains a few items of interest. The health and spirits of Elder Jaques are good, and he states that he has been the recipient of naught but kindness from Saint and sinner on his mission. The health of President Horne S. Eldridge was tolerably good at the time of writing; but the damp, foggy air and atmosphere of England, especially in the winter, makes him cough severely; Mrs. Eldridge is well.

Mr. Henry Vincent, the famous English orator, who it will be remembered, delivered one of his orations in the Tabernacle in this city at the latter part of the Summer, is lecturing on his experience among the "Mormons" in Salt Lake, and his tour to San

Francisco. Elder Jaques, interested in everything about Utah, naturally enough went to hear what Vincent had to say about the "Mormons," and he sends a few words about the lecture, which we append. Elder Jaques says:  
"I may as well say that on Tuesday I heard Henry Vincent describe his journey to Salt Lake and San Francisco. Not dwelling upon several of his mis-statements, he said he was courteously and generously treated by Brigham Young and the Mormons, to whom he had much pleasure in talking of Oliver Cromwell. Salt Lake City was clean, sober and orderly. He did not know that he had so many friends as he found there; but he thought the Mormon men were taciturn and the women had an air of sadness. He was not in favor of opposing polygamy by law, but he was sure it would die out by contact with the outer world."


