New York, Jan. 16.-The so-called prize fight cases, growing out of the fight be-tween Jimmy Britt and Terry McGovern at Madison Square Garden several m nths ago, came to an abrupt end today when a plea of guilty was entered by all the fourteen defendants. including Henry J. Pollock, promoter of the fight. Pollock was fined \$100, with the alternative of thirty days in the city prison. Sentence was suspended in the case of Britt and McGovern. All the others were discharged. The outcome of the case caused consid-erable surprise, as it was regarded as a test of the anti-boxing law.
