LOCAL BRIEFS.

Inspected Sheep—Sheep Inspector W. E. Day has returned from an inspection trip into Idaho, after looking over 300,000 sheep. He reports a marked improvement.

Government Jobs—There will be a civil service examination in this city, Oct. 17, for the position of scientific assistant in the department of Agriculture, at \$340 to \$1,200 a year.

Load of Lambs—The J. D. Wood Livestock company shipped today, a train load of lambs from Spencer, Ida., to Chicago for slaughter. The company is making such a shipment every week now, and will continue it into October.

Nikola Kaumans Here—Nikola Kaumans of the government agricultural department at Berlin, is in the city, while on an American tour, and visited the Utah Sugar offices Saturday afternoon, after calling on the governor.

Local Custom House—Collector Greenwald of the Salt Lake custom house reports a steady and a heavy business. Local business men are getting into the habit of importing direct to this city, instead of shipping to New York and getting fleeced by the brokers there.

New Electric Engine—The new electric engine of the Utah Light and Railway company is being set up at the railway barn. Setting the engine is the most formidable part of the work, and it may be several days before the machine can be run out. The equipment is very complete.

Soldiers For Fort—The war department has finally decided to station 11 companies of the Twenty-ninth infantry at Fort Douglas, the twelfth company going to Whipple barracks. The Twenty-first infantry will be located at Fort Logan on its return from the Philippines. This will make a full house at Fort Douglas.

Eagles' New Home—The McIntosh building at Second South and West Temple streets used for so many years by the Masons, has been secured by the Eagles, and will be refitted for their use. The furnishing will cost over \$4,000. The order has now a membership of 450, which it is proposed to double in the next year.

School for Embalmers—There will be a session of school for embalmers, conducted in this city, Oct. 8-12, by Prof. Eccles and Mohl of Denver, Idaho and Utah undertakers will be admitted free, and on the 13th, the state board of health will conduct an examination for such undertakers as desire it preliminary to awarding of certificates.

Medal Contest—There will be another medal contest, Thursday evening, under the direction of W. C. T. U. in the Hill M. E. church. The contestants will be Mrs. H. Smith, Mrs. A. H. Hawbury, Mrs. W. A. Wright, Mrs. Arthur Crocker, Mrs. Tom Pitt, Mrs. W. S. Dalton. The contest will be repeated Friday evening, in the First Presbyterian church.

Endorsed by M. & A.—The directors of the M. & A. association listened Saturday evening, to Harry P. Clark's outline of the plans proposed by his company for the building of an electric car line to Garfield, Bingham, Mill Creek and other places in the county. The directors concluded to endorse Mr. Clark. He is ready to begin work within 30 days after granting of the franchise.

Child Adopted—L. L. Bondurant and wife appeared before Judge Ritchie and legally adopted Ellen Jones, the 4-month-old daughter of Alice Jones. The father of the child is dead and the mother, on June 20, gave her to the Infants' Home and Protective association. Both the mother and the association signed a written consent to the adoption of the child by Mr. and Mrs. Bondurant.

Copy of Articles—The Norman Refrigerator company of Logan has filed a copy of its articles of incorporation with the secretary of state. The capital stock of the company is \$250,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$1 each. B. A. Norman is president; A. C. Lundstrom, vice president; A. A. Law, secretary and treasurer. The company owns the patent rights on a cold storage system and refrigerator patented by B. A. Norman.

Found Old Painting—John Maguire found recently in a Golconda, Nev., an old painting, representing "The First Mass," by Trouessart, the ceremony being held under a live oak at Monterey, Cal. There are over 60 figures in the painting, mostly soldiers and sailors. Mr. Maguire has secured the painting and presented it to Col. James A. Murray, vice president of the National Bank of the Republic of this city. Col. Murray is now at Monterey.

Woman Badly Hurt—Mrs. C. W. Mott of 529 First street, was knocked down by a buggy containing two women at Second South and Main streets last evening. When the occupants of the buggy saw what they had done they drove rapidly away, and were not identified. Mrs. Mott was cut about the face and stunned. She was taken into Smith's drug store where Dr. W. R. Ewing attended her, and she was then taken home by her next door neighbor, Ex-Gov. G. E. Heck.

DEATH FOLLOWS GUN SHOT WOUND

Emmet Richeson Shoots Himself
At Roominghouse and Dies
In a Hospital.

HAD TROUBLE IN HIS HOME.

Quarrelled With Wife in Logan, Came
To Salt Lake and Killed Himself
While Despondent.

After suffering intense agony for 10 hours, as the result of a gun-shot wound, self-inflicted, Emmet Richeson died at St. Mark's hospital at 1 o'clock yesterday morning. The man shot himself at 1:30 a. m. He was staying at the Columbia rooming house, 269 west South Temple street and is said to have been drinking during the afternoon and evening of Saturday. To friends whom he met he talked of suicide, giving as reasons for wishing to end his life, that he had had trouble with his wife at Logan. He came from that place a few days ago and was very despondent.

The weapon used was a shotgun, of the pump type, and was loaded with No. 6 shot. Richeson wrote a brief note, using a piece of wrapping paper, in which he said: "Tell Ann Richeson, telephone Bell 1488, Logan, and tell her Emmet Richeson has shot himself. Emmet R."

Placing the muzzle of the gun near his left breast, Richeson pulled the trigger and the full charge entered his body. Officer Timmins was nearby and entering the room found Richeson in a pool of blood. The victim was alive, but in a precarious condition. He was conveyed to the emergency hospital at the city jail where Dr. Paul attended him, and later he was taken to St. Mark's hospital. From the first it was apparent that he could not live, and after lingering until 11 o'clock, a. m. Richeson breathed his last.

Richeson's wife was apprised by telephone at Logan of what her husband had done. She was so terribly shocked at the news that she has since been prostrated. The couple have a child, who is 11 months old. Some difficulty arose between husband and wife last week, and the result was that Mr. Richeson came to Salt Lake and ended his life.

James R. Richeson, father of the suicide, came to the city yesterday and will take the body of his son to Cache county for burial. The father stated that of a slight character and wife was of a strong character and no one dreamed that it would have so pitiable an ending. Emmet Richeson was about 30 years of age and had been married about two years. His wife was formerly Miss Ann Blanchard.

A MINER'S SUICIDE.

Austrian Kills Himself on Account of
A Case of Unrequited Love.

An Austrian miner of Bingham, named John Riefel, shot himself Sunday afternoon using a .32 caliber revolver, and died almost instantly after firing the third shot. The act was committed in front of the Highland Boy office, and was witnessed by at least 20 persons. The man had acted queerly for some time past, and it is supposed that a love affair led up to the tragedy. Riefel has a wife and two children. The latter cannot account for the suicide. An inquest will be held over the remains of Riefel by Justice of the Peace George E. Lee.

HEALTH CONDITIONS.

Report of City Board for the Week
Ending Sept. 15.

Thirty-nine births were reported during the week, 14 males and 25 females. Twenty-six deaths were reported, 11 males and 15 females. Two bodies were shipped here for burial.

There were reported 20 cases of contagious and infectious diseases, consisting of 18 cases of typhoid fever, 1 case of whoopingcough, 1 case of pulmonary tuberculosis.

WOES OF COUNCILMEN.

City Fathers Had Strenuous Time on
Snowcapped Mountains.

The next time members of the city council take a junketing trip to mountains (like are snowcapped the year around, they will not wait until the middle of September to do so but will probably go in midsummer. The councilmen had a rather rough experience on Saturday afternoon and were lost in a blinding snowstorm about five miles from Brighton for over two hours. The party might have wandered around the mountains all night but for the accidental arrival of an engineering party from Alta, which plucked the lost officials back to the hotel at Brighton, where they remained all night. The most serious accident was the loss of Councilman Crabtree's hat, which made it necessary for him to expose his hairless head to the severe elements.

The object of the trip was to inspect a number of lakes and reservoir sites offered for sale to the city by Attorney J. M. Thomas for the sum of \$3,000. The same lakes were offered to the last administration by Mr. Thomas, but were rejected for the reason that the title to the same was not clear.

The lakes included in the deal are Twin lakes, Dog lake, Lake Mary, Lake Phoenix, Lake Martha, Lake Blanche, Lake Florence, Lake Lily and several other smaller ones, all located at the head of Big and Little Cottonwood canyons.

From Salt Lake the party went to Park City by train and arrived there at 10:20 o'clock Saturday morning. The trip from there to the reservoirs was made in wagons and on horseback. After lunch at the Brighton hotel they mounted horses and started over the

mountains to visit Twin lakes, Dog lake, Lake Mary, Phoenix and Martha, and it was upon the return from these lakes that the party was lost in the blinding snow storm. Mr. Thomas acted as guide for the party, but even his knowledge of the surrounding country did not help matters any, and the engineers from Alta put them back onto the trail.

On Sunday morning the party started down Big Cottonwood to the point where the trail goes up to Twin peaks at the foot of which lie Lakes Blanche, Florence and Lily. These lakes were inspected, and then the party went down the canyon to Maxfield's resort, where lunch was served, after which the trip was made to the mouth of the canyon, where the new intake to the conduit was inspected. The party then drove back to the city.

It is very likely that the committee will recommend to the council that the engineer make an estimate of the feasibility and the cost of constructing several dams at the lakes and making reservoir sites, and upon that official report will depend the advisability of buying the lakes. Those who took the trip are: Councilmen Black, Crabtree, A. J. Davis and E. G. O'Donnell, City Engineer, Keiser, Asst. Engineer Chaney, J. M. Thomas and two newspaper men.
