Onarrelled With Wife in Logan, Came To Salt Lake and Killed Himself While Despondent.

After suffering intense agony for 10 hours as the result of a gun-shot wound. self-inflicted, Emmet Richesen died at St. Mark's hospital at 1 o'clock yesterday morning. The man shot himself at 1:39 a. m. He was staying at the Columbia rooming house, 260 west South Temple street and is said to have been drinking during the afternoon and evening of Saturday. To friends whom he met he talked of suicide, giving as reasons for wishing to end his life, that he had had trouble with his wife at Logan. He came from that place few days ago and was very despond-

The weapon used was a shotgun, of the pump type, and was loaded with No. 6 shot. Richesen wrote a brief note, using a piece of wrapping paper, in which he said: "Tell Ann Richesen, telephone Bell 148k, Logan, and tell her Emmet Richeson has shot himself.

Emmet R." Placing the muzzle of the gun near his left breast, Richesen pulled the trigger and the full charge entered his body. Officer Timmins was nearby and entering the room found Richesen in a pool of blood. The victim was alive, but in a precarious condition. He was conveyed to the emergency hospital at the city jail where Dr. Paul attend-ed him, and later he was taken to St. Mark's hospital. From the first it was apparent that he could not live, and after lingering until 11 o'clock, a. m.

Richesen breathed his last. Richesen's wife was apprised by tele-phone at Logan of what her husband had done. She was so terribly shocked at the news that she has since been prostrated. The couple have a child, who is 11 months old. Some difficulty arose between husband and wife last week, and the result was that Mr. Richesen came to Salt Lake and ended

his life. James R. Richesen, father of the sulcide, came to the city yesterday and will take the body of his son to Cache county for burial. The father stated that the trouble between husband and wife was of a slight character and no one dreamed that it would have so piti-able an ending. Emmet Richesen was about 30 years of age and had been married about two years. His wife was formerly Miss Ann Blanchard.

mountains to visit Twin lakes. Dog lake, Lakes Mary, Phoebe and Mariha, and it was upon the return from these lakes that the party was lost in the blinding snow storm. These lakes were in-spected, and then the party went down the canyon to Maxileld's resort, where lunch was served, after which the trip was made to the mouth of the canyon, where the new intake to the conduit was inspected. The party then drove back to the city. It is very likely that the committee

WOES OF COUNCILMEN.

City Fathers Had Streamous Time on Snowcapped Mountains,

The next time members of the city souncil take a junketing trip to mountains which are snowcapped the year around, they will not wait until the middle of September to do so but will probably go in midsummer. The coun-cilmen had a rather rough experience on Saturday afternoon and were lost in a blinding snowstorm about five miles from Brighton for over two hours. The party might have wandered around the mountains all night but for the au cidental arrival of an engineering party from Alta, which piloted the lost offi-cials back to the hotel at Brighton. where they remained all night. The most serious accident was the loss of Councilman Crabtree's hat, which made it necessary for him to expose his hairless head to the severe elements. The object of the trip was to inspect a number of lakes and resevoir sites offered for sale to the city by Attorney sites J. M. Thomas for the sum of \$35,000. The same lakes were offered to the last administration by Mr. Thomas, but were rejected for the reason that title to the same was not clear. the Th
