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SIGNAL VICTORY FOR SUFFRAGETTES

Appealed Directly to King, Who Told Them Home Secretary Was Proper Channel.

Latest Heroine is Miss Wallace Dunlop Who Organized Hunger Strike in Jail and Was Discharged.

London, July 8.—Mrs. Despard and the contingent of suffragettes who have been investing the house of commons for the last week, with the hope of catching Premier Asquith, have scored a point in their fight for the contention that they have a constitutional right to present a petition to a responsible minister of the crown. The suffragettes appealed directly to the king, who informed them that the home secretary was the constitutional channel of communication, and his majesty apparently allowed this up with a hint that Mr. Gladstone would be advised to receive the women's deputation. In the face of Premier Asquith's persistent refusal to meet a deputation of suffragettes it is hardly conceivable that his lieutenant would consent to this course, as he did, without strong pressure. The suffragettes' deputation was received by the home secretary this evening.

Following a direct appeal made to the king by Mrs. Despard and a deputation of suffragettes, the home secretary, the Right Hon. H. J. Gladstone, according to a dispatch received this evening to eight of the women's representatives. Mrs. Despard was leader of the deputation. After
