NEW YORK, 6.—The Sun says the Liberal movement has been faithful to their pledges.

The Tribune adds, the Liberal movement was at one time formidable, and had not its progress in the State elections of the last three months, it might have swept the country.

The Liberal movement in North Carolina, Vermont and Maine was nearly neutralized by the Democrats, who would not "take care" when they could get from five to twenty dollars each for not eating it. There was nothing purchasable in the Keystone State that was not bought.

The Times says that while it regards the defeat of Charles S. Johnson in Orange district and John H. Ketchum in Dutchess district, there is yet a certainty of having carried six districts, now represented by Democrats, and with the Congressional election, the next State delegation will be 28 Republicans to 10 Democrats, whereas at present it is 15 Republicans to 14 Democrats. It calculates the assembly, at the worst, at 79 Republicans to 59 Democrats.

Thousands thronged the bulletin boards at the office, and elsewhere, to hear the election news in the city.

Last night at the Cooper Institute, the Republicans assembled and speeches were made, and a general celebration was indulged in. A like celebration was also had at Tammany Hall.

Whitehouse, Dem., is elected to Congress in the 1st district.

BALTIMORE, 6.—The indications are that the State will give Grant 5,000 majority. Wilson, Democrat, is probably elected in the first district, and Fisher, Dem., in the 2nd. The 3rd district the contest was close. Lowmeyer, Rep., is elected in the 6th district by 1,600 majority.

NEWARK, N. J., 6.—The Democrats concede the State to Grant by 5,000 majority. The legislature is Republican by a small majority.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., 6.—Bochester gives Grant seven thousand majority, and Monroe county 3,500. Freeman Clark, Republican, is elected to Congress in the 20th district.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., 6.—The returns from all but four towns give Grant a majority of 444.

NEWARK, N. J., 6.—Republicans now claim the State by 5,500 majority.

RICHMOND, Va., 6.—In ninety-eight precincts in thirty counties, including Richmond City, Grant has 2,093 majority. In these precincts Democrats have made but few gains, while the Republicans have gained steadily. Both parties claim the election of Smith for Congress, over Wise, in this district.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., 6.—In five counties, partially heard from, the estimated Republican majority is 3,000.

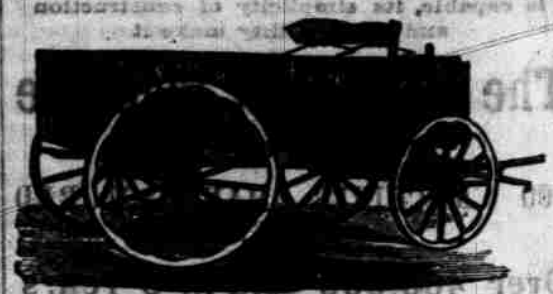
WINNINGTON, Del., 6.—Grant and Wilson have carried the State by a small majority. There are large Republican gains everywhere throughout the State.
