ANOTHER PIONEER GOES TO HER REST

Mrs. Hannah Telford of West Weber Lays Down Life's Cares at 87.

SUIT AGAINST CLAY COMPANY.

Mrs. Hannah Telford, one of the pioneer women of Weber county, died yesterday morning at the home of her son-in-law, Charles H. Greenwell, 509 Twenty-third street, of general debility. The life of the deceased was one of usefulness and energy, she being ever ready to lend a helping hand to her associates in life. Her kindness of nature endeared her to all who knew her, and notwithstanding the fact that she was advanced in age, her death was not unexpected.

Mrs. Telford was born at Burnfield, Durham, England, Nov. 22, 1816. In the year 1851 she joined the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, to which she was faithful to the end. Forty-two years ago Mrs. Telford emigrated from her native land to Utah, where she lived for the remainder of her life. The funeral services will be held at the West Weber meetinghouse tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock. Interment will take place at West Weber.

The charge tore its way through the flesh part of the right arm below the elbow, his companions assisted him to a conveyance, bound up his arm as best they could, and brought him to the city. Orr is now in the hospital, and it is expected that he will be disabled for several weeks; he is progressing very favorably.

Provo, Utah Co., Dec. 16.—A meeting of the board of trustees of the Brigham Young university was held last evening in the office of Jesse Knight, for the purpose of taking action on the resignation of President B. Cluff, Jr. There were present of the board, Vice President David John, W. H. Dusenberry, John Henry Smith, Lafayette Holbrook, Jesse Knight, Stephen L. Chipman, Oscar B. Young, and Richard W. Young. Dr. J. M. Tanner, general superintendent of the school, was also present, together with President Cluff and Prof. E. H. Holt, secretary of the university faculty.

The resignation of President Cluff was accepted, to take effect on the 23rd inst. The end of the present semester. It was decided not to appoint a president at this time, but Dr. George H. Brimball was appointed acting president. He is now in Raymond, Canada, and will be notified of his appointment, and it is expected, will return immediately to assume the duties of the office.

Prof. Cluff expects to leave for Mexico early in January to take charge of the affairs of the Utah-Mexican Rubber company as superintendent.
