**For Europe.**—This afternoon Elder John Ekman left for Ogden, at which point he will join the company of missionaries going east tomorrow. His destination is Sweden, his native country. He has been connected with the United Order of Tailors since the organization of that association.

**Improving.**—We learn that the condition of Brother B. S. Young, hurt in yesterday's railroad accident, is quite favorable. He will probably soon recover.

**Theatre—Carl Bosco.**—The Theatre will be open on Friday and Saturday evenings next. Carl Bosco, the world-famed illusionist, assisted by the beautiful and accomplished Mlle Ada Joliet will appear in their mystifying exhibition of magic art. A grand Matinee will be given on Saturday afternoon, on which occasion, in addition to the regular performance, every lady and child attending will obtain a beautiful present. **Fire at Hebron—A Residence and Store Consumed.**—The following is a special dispatch to the News: Hebron, Oct. 31.

**Editors Deseret News:** This morning, about 1 a.m., a fire broke out at the residence of Bishop G. H. Crosby. A good, comfortable home, well furnished, including the Hebron Co-operative Store, being all destroyed. The wardrobe and most of the household furniture were saved. The fire was first discovered by Sister Crosby, in the store; its origin is not known. The bishop was absent from home, at St. George. The loss is estimated at between two and three thousand dollars.

**A Novel Bedstead.**—John Gunn, an aged and respectable man, though quite poor, lives in the northern part of the 20th Ward, making a somewhat meagre subsistence by manufacturing mouse-traps. He has an ingenious turn, which he has recently exhibited by making a bedstead from no other materials than old castaway fish and fruit cases, which he had previously picked up and accumulated for the purpose, and some pieces of stout wire. It is a complete article, having posts, head, side and foot boards, and is embellished with an embossed ornamental work. It only weighs about ten or twelve pounds, and is strong and durable, and, properly painted, quite inviting to the eye. We question if another bedstead of the like is extant. In making the one mentioned, the old gentleman has exhibited several commendable qualities—Ingenuity, industry and economy.

**Furious.**—A gentleman who was in Farmington yesterday states that the wind storm that then prevailed was the most powerful and furious he ever witnessed. He says that many thousands of dollars worth of hay must have been carried away and scattered and straw abundant for miles, many stacks having been demolished completely.

**Mutual Improvement.**—At the last regular meeting of the 14th Ward Young Men's Mutual Improvement Association, the following officers were elected to serve for the ensuing year: Wm. W. Taylor, President; Jno. P. Horne and M. T. Cowley, counselors; Jno. W. Taylor, Secretary; David O. Miner, Treasurer; T. E. Taylor, Librarian.

**In New Mexico.**—When last heard from Elders Pratt, the two brothers Stewart, Garf and Terry, of the Mexican mission, were at Las Lunas, New Mexico. They expected, before long, to commence their journey homeward. The Catholic priests in the region in which they had been traveling had worked hard to create prejudice against them, and succeeded to a considerable extent. The priests had even stirred up against them a feeling of hostility among the Indians.

**Sunday School.**—There will be an entertainment, for which a choice programme has been arranged, at the 13th Ward Assembly Rooms, on Thursday (to-morrow) evening. There will be songs, recitations, choruses, duets, quartettes, etc. The proceeds are to be devoted to the benefit of the ward Sunday school.

Mr. E. T. Woolley, assisted by Mr. H. Field, will conduct the exercises and Mr. A. C. Smyth will be the accompanist.

**Indian Root.**—The root now being extensively used by many persons, and which is vended by the Indians for "two bits" for a small piece, is the "Pah-net-suah" of the Pah Ute tribes, and the *Ligusticum Apifolium* of botanists. It is the Angelica, and can be obtained at Bear Valley and Red Creek in great abundance, according to Dr. Edward Palmer.

This plant belongs to the Umbelliferous family, and is allied to the esculent species, such as parsnip, carrot, and the Archangelica Officialis of the *Materia Medica*. It is used by some people, by chewing the root, also in the form of a decoction and extract, in cases of cold, sore throat and other similar complaints. It is occasionally used in hot fomentations for the allaying of swellings.

**City Council.**—The Council met last evening, Mayor Little presiding.

Geo. A. Wiscombe petitioned for the privilege of erecting a platform over the water seat, in front of his premises, First South Street; referred to the committee on streets and alleys.

John N. Pike petitioned for the privilege of placing a tank by the water ditch on Centre Street, for the purpose of conveying water therefrom to his residence, in a pipe; granted, providing the pipe be not larger than one inch in diameter, and the water to be used for culinary purposes only.

The committee on fire department, to whom was referred the petition of the Salt Lake Gas Company, asking that the east half of the block upon which the gas works are situated be included in the fire limits, reported that the provisions of the fire ordinance did not give the council authority to divide a block, extending the fire limits over report was adopted.

Bill for furnishings for the jail, \$203.50; allowed.

One thousand dollars was appropriated for the Mayor's contingent fund.

The Council adjourned till next Tuesday evening at seven o'clock.
