TALK OF THE TOWN.

The Primary Fair was open again today.

The Bishops meet to-morrow night.

Sunshine and shadow have alternated to-day.

Iron City, in Southern Utah, begins to loom.

A sanitary ordinance is the next thing on the tapis.

Snow on the mountains east and west, this morning.

The Priesthood meeting of the Stake will be held on Saturday, at 11 a.m.

Fred Moss, charged with obstructing the Utah Central near Milford, is in jail at Beaver.

A little son of Isaac Furness, of Ogden, accidentally shot himself through the left palm on Tuesday.

Hill & Trevelia, saloon-keepers, were fined \$50 each, yesterday, for selling liquor after hours. They appealed to the District Court.

The defendant McConnell, spoken of in the District Court minutes, is "Jack Emerson," charged with complicity in the murder of John F. Turner.

"Bill Nye," editor of the Laramie Boomerang, the leading comic paper of the West, left for home this morning, after spending a few days in Salt Lake.

Phineas Cox, of Silver Reef, a witness before the grand jury against James Clark, was waylaid on Bonanza Flat near that town, last Wednesday night, and cruelly and maliciously beaten and injured.

Abraham Hodges was instantly killed on Friday last, while working at a lathe and shingle mill in Logan Canyon. A piece of wood flew from a circular saw, and buried itself in the skull of the unfortunate man.

Mr. J. H. Hague, of Sandy, and Miss Janie Peacock, of Mant, were married at the latter place yesterday, by Mayor Hougard. The young couple will be in Salt Lake on October 3d and 4th, at the residence of Mr. D. G. Calder.

Fifth of July Prizes.—The Committee on Amusements, appointed for the 4th of July celebration, have been holding the prizes offered by various parties for that occasion, thinking an opportunity would yet be presented of having some sort of a jollification, in lieu of the abandoned "Fourth." President Garfield's death, however, has stifled all desire to carry out the project, and those who contributed the prizes may have them returned by calling at Savage's Art Gallery.

Returned Elders.—Elder Christen Jensen, of Moroni, returned on Thursday evening from a mission to Denmark; whither he went on the 9th of September, 1879. He traveled in Jutland, presided over the Aarhus Branch for six months, and was afterwards President of that Conference for about a year and a half. Four hundred souls were added to the Conference during this time, 301 of whom have emigrated. There was no persecution and people seemed favorably disposed towards the truth. In Germany persecutions continue. Considerable means had been sent to the Scandinavian mission, by friends in Utah, to assist the poor to emigrate. The work was rolling on steadily. The loss of President Wilhelmson was much regretted. Brother Jensen made the trip to and from Europe without any difficulty. He returns feeling well, and gold could not buy his experience gained while abroad.

Elder Andrew Jensen, of Pleasant Grove, formerly of the firm of Jensen & Bruun, publishers of the life of Joseph the Prophet, in the Danish language, returned last Sunday morning from a mission to Scandinavia, upon which he started in May, 1879. His labors were confined to the office of the Scandinavian Star, but besides his editorial duties, his main work was an entire new revision of the Book of Mormon, printed in the Danish language. The book is a handsome volume, clearly printed and nicely bound, the matter being newly divided into chapters and verses, accompanied with copious footnotes. It is a very handsome piece of work, and reflects much credit upon all concerned in its edition. Brother Jensen had charge of the Scandinavian mission from the death of President Wilhelmson until the arrival of his successor, Bro. Fjeldsted, and has written to the News at intervals during his absence abroad. He returns in good health and excellent spirits.

Counterfeits.—There are probably not a very large number of business men in any community who care to be imposed upon by swindling counterfeiters. To all those who would avoid deception and loss, it is not only important that these base imitations should be detected, but it is highly important that some method should be known by which they can be detected instantly, for those who handle considerable sums have not the time to enter into a careful and extended examination of each note as it is handled. Herein, we think, lies the superiority of Mr. Hoover's system of detection. He gives certain points, perceptible at a glance, that are almost infallible indications of the genuine, and whenever a bill is lacking in any of these criteria, it is thrown out until it can be subjected to a more careful analysis, which proves beyond all possibility of cavil whether it is true or false. Mr. Hoover, furnishes all those who avail themselves of his instruction, with a list of the most delicate and intricate points conceivable, besides the perfect imprint of the true bill, from proof impressions of the government plates, and he comes fully endorsed by the Superintendent of the Bureau of Engraving at Washington.

Dr. Bernhiel Dead.—The melancholy news of the death of Doctor John M. Bernhiel, was brought to this office a short time before our paper went to press this afternoon. The sad event occurred about 11.40 a. m. to-day. The immediate cause was intermittent fever, from which he had been prostrated four or five days, but he was aged and feeble before, and his demise, therefore, could not be called premature. Deceased was born June 23rd, 1839, at Sandy Hill, Pennsylvania, and was an early member of the Church, which he joined in the State of New York. He was an intimate friend of the Prophet Joseph Smith and was universally respected and beloved for his integrity and many noble virtues. He was a man of intelligence and education, and was the first Delegate from Utah to the Congress of the United States. He lived a long and useful life and died firm in the faith of the Everlasting Gospel.

The funeral will be held on Friday next, but the time and place have not yet been designated.

Special Premium.—W. S. Sears, Esq., manager of the Ogden Co-operative Institution, offers a very valuable special premium in connection with the approaching fair. The prize is \$25 for the best ten bushels of wheat, all of one kind, exhibited at the fair. The wheat must be clean and free from smut, and unless it is all of one kind it cannot compete for the prize. At present many kinds are mixed together by the farmers, and it is not infrequently happens that in purchasing all kinds of wheat may be found in the lot. The object of Mr. Sears, in offering this prize, is to induce Utah farmers to keep their kinds of wheat separate, and what all of a kind grown separately from that of a different kind. The benefits that would accrue to farmers from carrying out the desire of Mr. Sears are manifold, and need no recommendation nor enumeration to wide-awake farmers.

The Home Dramatics.—This popular and talented combination have in preparation for Fair and Conference week, three splendid pieces. The first is the celebrated drama, "The False Friend," which will be played for the first time in Utah, on Tuesday, October 4th. On the following night, the Club will repeat their brilliant success, "Queen's Evidence," which won the public favor so completely two weeks ago, and on the 7th, the second day of Conference, the great play of the "Ranker's Daughter" will be presented for the special accommodation of Conference visitors. The Careless Orchestra will play with the Club each night, their only appearance during the week. The Club will be supported by Miss Nellie Colebrook, Miss Edith Clawson and other accomplished artists.

"Sea of Ice."—This magnificent spectacular drama will be presented at the Theatre next Monday evening, the first day of the Territorial Fair, by the Salt Lake Dramatic Combination, including Messrs. Lindsay, Margretts, Graham and other veteran actors. New scenery is being painted for this charming play, which will be put upon the boards with all the thrilling and beautiful effects which attended its repeated successful presentations in former years. It has been admirably cast, and is bound to be a big success. The company have other fine pieces also in rehearsal for Conference. See their mammoth posters.
