# PROVO. M. D'S FAVOR VACCINATION

Medical Fraternity Making Organized Effort to Force It Upon the People by Legislation.

#### Recting of Medical Society at Payson -Discuss Vaccinstion and Endorse Course of Health Boards.

Provo, Jan. 11 .- The Utah County Medical society held its regular month ly meeting at Payson, January Sth, at the office of Dr. Henry. An interesting paper was read by Dr. Henry on the "Sequelae of Scarlet Fever." The subject was discussed

by the members. Dr. Tidyman, of Pleasant Grove, was elected a member of the society.

DISCUSS VACCINATION.

After some minor matters of business was disposed of the subject of smallpox and vaccination was discussed. A committe of three was elect d to co-operate with the Salt Lake and ed to co-operate with the Bart Lake and Weber County Medical Societies in presenting the proper legitimate infor-inataien to members of the Legislature inatalen to members of the Legislature encerning a law governing vaccinat-ing and powers of boards of health. Drs. Allen and Robison of Provo and Dr. Aird of Heber City constitute this committee. They were given full power to represent the Utah County Medical register and were urged to do their utto represent the Utah County Medical society and were urged to do their ut-most in alding the passing of a proper vaceination law. The society is unan-imously in favor of vaccination and hold that it is the only known preventive of smallpox and therefore urged gen-eral vaccination and re-vaccination in time of epidemics. The following reso-lution was upanimously adopted, and time of epidemies. My own prefer-ered is for any fall. ence is for early fall. Trees become settled and new roots formed before cold weather comes, and if a good mulching of some kind, leaves or long manure, be placed about them, to keep frost from the roots, they rarely fail to live. Early spring is good, especialy if great heat does not come until a few roots have been made. Besides for hedging, single specimens of ever-greens should be planted about a place oth for protection and for beauty sake Their green follage is certainly a cheering sight when deciduous trees are showing their bare branches .- Practical Farmer.

#### BEAUTIFY YOUR FARM.

There are so many ways of enhancing the beauty of the farm, and with so little trouble and expense, that it is to be wondered at that the majority of farmers do not take advantage of them. Many unsightly pools near the roadside might be made lovely by sowing grass to the edge of the pond and having flags, cattalls and water-lilles growing in and around the water. It takes no more nourishment from the land to grow a good grape-vine on the fence than it does the weeds we so often see. Apple, cherry and plum trees standing outside of the fence cost no more after planting than does the box elder or willow, requiring only an occasional pruning. Wire fences, which are so opular now, make a very suitable suport for the grape-vine and such othe ines as the columbine, the bittersweet climbing roses or clematis. The wood-bine or Virginia creeper would be especially good as a beautifier, being a vivid green all summer and a flaming ed all through the autumn. Walnut, butternut and hickory trees

interspersed with vines, lilac, snowball and syringa bushes and an occasional fruit-tree would not only enhance the beauty of the farm, but also the value of it. This ornamental and useful growth by the wayside would be an agreeable change from white clover and many obnoxious weeds. Then, to have such lovely things to give away (for one would expect the passer-by to par-take of them) would in itself fill the generous soul with delight. Ther might be many who would abuse these privileges at first, but if fruit and flower culture by the roadside can be prac-tised in Germany, and none molest or abuses this privilege, it appears to me that in our own beautiful nation, with all its lovely school system, we should be able to teach the rising generations p respect so noble and generous a feeling that would prompt a farmer to not only beautifuy his farm for others, but to give to the weary traveler a royal hospitality.-Minta Rulow Roadhouse, in Farm and Fireside.

# KAYSVILLE.

#### LECTURE ON VACCINATION.

Order of "Board" Considered an Unnecessary Blunder and is Opposed. Special Correspondence.

Kaysville, Utah, Jan. 9.-Nearly 100 persons attended a public meeting held at the ward meeting house here today, which was addressed by Dr. Baker, State quarantine inspector, on the efficacy of vaccination as a preventive of The doctor was very earnest in his de-

fense of the recent action of the State board of health in causing the schools of this district to be closed against all unvaccinated children and teachers, and advised the people to comply with the order. Towards the close of his re-marks he good naturedly yielded to numerous questions, which finally pre-cipitated a "free for all" discussion, in which some took a stand for, and others explose vaccing the mandate of against vaccination, and the mandate of the State health board was pretty generally disapproved. The only thing agreed upon was the appointment of a ee to investigate some phases t the school matter, and report at a 7 meeting

This school district comprises all of Kaysville and part of Layton precinct. There are now four cases of smallpox the district and the nearest one of these cases is about four miles away from one school house and two to three lies away from three others, to which

# EVERGREEN HEDGES FOR FARMS.

In the vicinities of cities, where the homes of the wealthy are more often located than they are in the country. an evergreen hedge is to be found on almost every estate, Often it is to form a boundary division, sometimes along the highway, or lining a driveway to the dwelling, or again, in forming a di-vision between the ornamental grounds and the vegetable garden. The farmer is not often in a position to plant hedges by a cross-bar on the outside. On both for other purposes than profit, otherwise to have them as his richer neigh-bor may have would be very gratifying. But as a boundary to an orchard or a fruit or vegetable garden, a hedge of evergreens is of much profit, because of the protection from cold winds in the air ordinarily, winter and early spring. Everyone This rug is cut

cheaper rate than most others. The Norway spruce is a strong and vigor-ous grower and I have seen it used in New York State and in other places as a protection hedge to fruit orchards; and when it is of from six to twelve feet high, it is indeed a great protection. Hemlock is of less rugged appearance, and is not quite as good for very windy places as the Norway, but where it is used it forms one of the most pleasing of hedges. The arbor vitæ, like the hemlock, is better fitted for less trying places. For boundaries where space is limited owing to its columnar habit of growth it is the very thing When When growing alone on a lawn a tree twelve feet high will be no more than three

to plant where height is wanted with-out breadth. It is common to see it used as a boundary to a small garden. for which purpose its natural habit of growth eminently fits it. These ever-greens, as well as any others, may be pruned in almost any way desired. The tops may be taken off if getting too late or if more breadth and less height is desired.
