

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

REMEMBER the two days' meetings at the Tabernacle on Saturday and Sunday.

THEATRE.—Last night, owing most likely to the very inclement state of the weather, the attendance at the Theatre was rather small; but the playing throughout, in both pieces, was highly satisfactory. Mr. Margetta performing excellently as "Crepin, the Crier," and as "Splish."

A splendid bill is in preparation for Saturday evening: "Lute the Laborer," and "Naval Engagements," both standard pieces, and in which an excellent cast will appear.

DISTRICT COURT.—Yesterday the trial of Olney, for assault, with intent to kill, on the person of Mr. Sloan, of the Salt Lake Herald, was disposed of. The defendant was fined \$100.

Judge McKean stated, at the trial, that, had it not been that Mr. Sloan had earnestly appealed for leniency to be extended to the prisoner, no consideration could have been given him from the Penitentiary. The Judge dwelt severely upon the inhuman and brutal conduct of the prisoner.

The case of Captain Bates versus the Union Pacific R. R. Company is settled, the parties having compromised.

IN TOWN.—S. B. Reed, Esq., whose name, in connection with the surveying of the route for the Great Continental Railroad and in the construction of the Union Pacific Railroad, is so familiar to the people of this Territory, is in town, having arrived here two days ago. His stay will not be lengthy. He purposes to return East again. Mr. Reed's health, judging by his appearance, has much improved since the completion of the Railroad. Previous to that his labors were excessive and he had the appearance of an overworked man.

The season of the year is such that work is not very pressing, and the time thus devoted will be probably spent, and all will derive benefit by attending them. Curiosity has been excited as to the object of the meetings, it not having been customary to convene such extra gatherings, in this city; we may say that they are solely for the purpose of religious instruction. The holding of such meetings in the settlements has been attended with such excellent results that President Young has been prompted to make this extra time devoted to waiting before the Lord will be equally as beneficial to the citizens of this and surrounding cities as in other places where similar meetings have been held.

SINGULAR ACCIDENT.—Our correspondent, "A. C.," of Brigham City, sends us an account of a singular accident which occurred at that place two or three days since to a child two and a half years old, the son of Mr. M. C. Jensen. It appears that the child was playing in a corral, in which was an old and very gentle cow, and by some means one of the horns of the cow got into the child's mouth, tearing a T-shaped wound in his cheek. The poor little fellow was made to endure great pain, but under the influence of chloroform and the skill of Dr. Ormsby, Jr., the wound was sewed up and dressed, and is progressing favorably.

Our correspondent furnishes an item, indicating, we think, a terrible dearth of mental pabulum in Brigham City, namely, that its citizens are turning out en masse to listen to the crazy rantings of a lecturer on phrenology, biology (and nonsense in general), who bored the citizens here in a similar manner as long as three would go to listen to him.
